

Technology seems to be in the forefront with our members right now, so let me share a little of the latest interest with you. Dick Thomas, AC7SW, alerted us to an article which appeared on a NASA web site entitled "Are Sunspots Disappearing?" I'll whet your appetite a little with the opening two sentences: "The sun is in the pits of the deepest solar minimum in nearly a century. Weeks and sometimes whole months go by without even a single tiny sunspot. The quiet has dragged out for more than two years, prompting some observers to wonder, are sunspots disappearing?" Our September AARC meeting was also technologically informative. Gary Hamman, K7GH, gave a program on antenna modeling using the EZNEC antenna software by W7EL. The EZNEC program is a powerful but easy-to-use program for modeling and analyzing nearly any kind of antenna in its actual operating environment. EZNEC plots azimuth and elevation patterns; tells you gain, feed point impedance, SWR, and current distribution; finds and reports beamwidth, 3-dB pattern points, f/b ratio, takeoff angle, side lobe characteristics, and more. All information, including patterns, can be displayed on screen or printed on any Windows compatible printer. As Gary demonstrated, using the antenna specifications of Shel Stone's, K7SLS's, 10meter antenna project-in-progress, you can describe the antenna (and other nearby structures if desired) as a group of straight conductors, choosing the orientation, length, and diameter. Add sources at the feed points and, if desired, transmission lines, a realistic ground, and loads to simulate loading coils, traps, or similar components. Using this description method, you can quickly analyze Yagis, quads, phased arrays, towers, loops, nearly any type of antenna or parasitic structure. This was a very valuable program, and will prove especially fruitful to several of our members who are presently installing or improving antenna systems.

You may recall that I requested reminiscences of amateur radio experiences that impressed our members. Several people have hinted that these memories are in the process of being put on paper, but Leslie Hickey, N5LDH, expressed her vivid recollections regarding setting up the AARC's April

Ham Fest during the inclement weather we experienced. Leslie relates, "On April 11, 2009, I took part in our Ham Fest held in the parking lot at DeVry University. We set up on Friday, April 10th, fighting winds that tried to take off with our canopy which ended up fastened to Gary Hamman's camper truck. Luckily, it didn't fly away with Gary's truck in tow. That was not the end of it. On Saturday morning it poured rain and hail, but that didn't stop 30 vendors from setting up and 172 faithful hams from attending, while members of our club, umbrellas in hand, sold soggy tickets to the attendees. By 10:00 a.m. we decided it was time to close down. Of course, once we were done, the SUN came out!!!" There is no doubt that many of the AARC members who were there at the set-up rate that event high on the memorable experience scale.

George Cooney, KQ7C, set down on paper his thoughts concerning the aspect of amateur radio that has been special for him. George relates, "I do not have any outstanding things in my years of ham radio activity no major disasters worked or inventions created for the good of ham radio. But when I first joined the club at the invitation of W7WGW, I settled in as a run-of-the-mill type of guy sitting there watching things happen at each club meeting. Then one night a man dropped in to see what our club was all about, and at the end of the meeting he was our new club President! Soon after that he approached me and said, 'This club is dormant, and we need to do something.' I was all ears. He talked us all into having a yard sale to raise money. We did that, and then he sent me out to find a place to hold a Hamfest. On Saturday, May 15th, 1993, in the south parking lot of Christown Mall, the club held its first Hamfest. It was a smash! We were amazed at how good it made all of us feel. We were on the map, and we were no longer so POOR! We have held an annual Hamfest ever since and have done well, and we even earned a bit of a good reputation from our attendees. The fact that I was able to hold the job of Activities Manager for the club for 14 years has given me the most satisfying part of my 32 years as a licensed Ham. I must admit I didn't see it as serving others at the time, but now I know that is just what it comes down to, and I highly recommend it to all. I had lots of help along the way, and I thank you who gave that help. I especially appreciate the driving force behind it, Tom Ivan, KF7GC, who accepted the presidency of the club on his first visit to the club's meeting night. He planted the seed that would grow into the part of my Ham career of which I am most proud. Talking on the radio is fun; so are parties and all the rest. But serving others in some way is at the top of the list in my opinion."

Thanks Leslie and George for your feelings about how amateur radio has been an impressive and important part of your lives. I'm sure it has made others think of the amateur radio involvement and has made some of them thankful to be a part of the ham fraternity.

How the Center for Amateur Radio Learning Began

In preparation for the meeting, I prepared an agenda and I outlined a proposed organizational structure. The meeting was a success and we met weekly thereafter to plan the station.

After Carl was organized, my part in building the station was relatively small, although I stayed in the background and helped whenever I could. The station has been in operation about eight years and since I am no longer active, all I can do is show pride in my achievement.
