

Hi Guys,

The October program on propagation by Bob Johnsen K7TR was great. I relearned a lot of valuable information that I had forgotten about radio waves. I am not an avid DXer but over the years I have made many DX contacts. I have in the past listened for the various beacons on 20 meters to see how the bands are doing. With the low sun spot count the bands have not been very good for a long time, but I have hope they will be improving steadily. His program reminded me that our hobby has its roots in very technical electronic theory but it is easily understood when someone like Bob explains it. I found myself in my radio shack after the club meeting and I tried a few bands. I always get fired up about ham radio at club meetings and this was no different. I imagined the wave of my CQ bouncing off the ionosphere and the ground. I was on 40 meter CW which was very quiet. I put out several calls and finally heard someone trying to answer my call. We both tried to make it work, but he was just too weak and in the noise level so I could not make contact. My signal to him was probably the same so he could not copy me well either. After that, I tried for about 30 minutes on other frequencies, but with no success. And that is the way it has been lately. You have to remember that maybe there are a lot of hams out there that are just listening and if you put out a CQ that could get some action.

The program for November is on an older DXpedition. I always like these types of programs because it shows how resourceful hams can be when working in far off locations with minimal support. And the Q's they get is just plain amazing. I have made contact on some of the South Pacific DX locations in the past and I look forward to better band conditions the next time someone is "out there."

The weather is finally cooling off a bit. And we have had a monster storm hit the valley and the high country. Four or five tornados hit around Flagstaff causing a lot of damage. Down here, we had high winds and a lot of hail. At my QTH, we did not have really high winds and no hail. But not far from here the hail broke a lot of skylights. Up north, the hail dented a lot of cars and has made a mess of trees and gardens. I do not know if storm spotters were activated in that area or not. Maybe someone out there knows more about that and can give me a report for next month's addition.

My vision has been getting much worse this year. In August, I went to my optometrist thinking my problem was my astigmatism and a new prescription for glasses was all I needed. Well, he told me I had cataracts in my right eye that needed to be removed. So I had cataract surgery in September and now I can see again. These things come on slowly so you

don't realize how bad your vision is getting. After the surgery, you can truly see again. Before surgery, my vision in my right eye was 80/20 (that's bad). A week or so after surgery it is 20/20 with my old glasses. And it will even be better with a new prescription.

Bonnie and I are planning a trip to Boston this month. We have never been there and I am looking forward to seeing the numerous places I have read and studied about in school. That area is the birthplace of the American Revolution. The travel books list hundreds of places I have only read about and places frequented by our founding fathers. The entire downtown area has many of these important buildings and places to see. They say the way to see it is to follow the freedom walk. Which we are planning to do, but I sprained my ankle the other day and right now, I am limping around on it. I may not be able to walk as much as I would like.

Our club meetings will be meeting at 7:00 P.M. which is one half hour earlier than usual. The Senior Center will be closing at 9:00 P.M. instead of 10:00 P.M., so we will be starting the meeting one half hour earlier. Please make a note of this. See you at the meeting.

The club has a weekly net on 147.18 with a PL of 162.2. It is a general conversation net and I usually am net control. We talk about things of interest to all hams. Check us out.

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PATCHES - DECALS



After our trip to San Diego to the ARRL Southwestern Division Convention, I can't help but let you know what you missed if you didn't go. The technical sessions I attended were exceptional, and I will give you a little summary of what I heard, as well as showing you a few of the many photos I took there.

On Friday afternoon I attended two sessions. The first was called "VHF Roving from Coast to Coast," presented by Wayne Overbeck, N6NB. I don't know if you know about roving. I didn't. Ever since the advent of the grid square multiplier system in amateur radio, "roving" in VHF/UHF/microwave radio contests has been popular. Because some grid squares have little or no local radio activity, the grid square multiplier system encouraged roving stations to travel to various grid squares during VHF/UHF radio contests. What they do is akin to a road rally with amateur radio equipment aboard. Wayne talked about his rover group and how they operated. They would work systematically, getting 600 radio contacts in an hour, and then they'd go on to another grid square. The second Friday session was given by Marty Woll, N6VI, who talked about "Choosing the Right Coax Cable." Did you know that 100 feet of RG-58U loses 13% of its signal at 80 meters but a whopping 72% at 2 meters? But LMR-400, with a solid center conductor, will lose only 5% at 80 meters and 29% at 2 meters. Marty gave us a great deal of helpful coax information.

On Saturday I heard Pat Bunsold, WA6MHZ, tell in detail how to restore old antique radios. Pat later was given the ARRL award for his volunteer work at the ARRL Forum. At lunch on Saturday Joseph Fairclough, WB2JKJ, spoke on "Education through Communication." As a teacher Joseph taught English to students who supposedly "couldn't learn." He did this through use of amateur radio. Morse code in his class taught students spelling and vocabulary, World Radio Magazine was used for reading class, and business letters were sent to the MFJ company. It was an idea that worked, and his talk was very inspirational.

Also on Saturday Carl Gardenias, WU6D, spoke on "Keeping Amateur Radio Viable in the 21st Century," giving ideas as to how to interest people in amateur radio and how to re-energize the club. John Kountz, KE6GFF/T6EE, described his DXpeditions to Kabul in Afghanistan. The

DXpeditions netted 6,000 contacts more than 64 days within a three-year period.

The final afternoon session prior to the banquet was the ARRL Forum, conducted by Dick Norton, N6AA, ARRL Southwest Division Director. Dick discussed some of the problems that the ARRL is working to solve: the problem with the ARRL web site, financial problems, work on the log book of the world, and lobbying for legislation against undue antenna restrictions. Dick also discussed the FCC's recent action to disallow any amateur involvement in emergencies in the private sector. The ARRL's position is that if there is a problem involving a private corporation and this problem creates an emergency to the public sector, the radio amateur has a commitment to help remedy the situation.

At Saturday's banquet Chris Imlay, W3KD, spoke about antenna regulations in southern California, the "hotbed" of local antenna regulatory problems. He also discussed attempts by municipal governments and homeowner's associations to regulate radio frequency interference, and he also brought us up to date on FCC proceedings involving Amateur Radio and the protection of our frequencies in the United States. At the banquet special awards were given to Nate Brightman, K6OSC, and Mike Maston, N6OPH.

On Sunday we attended the DX breakfast and were treated to a presentation by Bob Grimmick, N6OX, who operated YI9PSE in Erbil in Kurdistan in 2010. His photos and the description of the experience kept all of us enthralled. Bob and his group found that many of their problems were easily solved by "having tea" with the right people. The group made 50,400 QSOs. 19,000 were unique.

My final tech session was presented on Sunday. That session was a Net Control Class held by Marti Woll, N6VI. This was especially valuable to me since I had just had my initial session as net control on the AARC 2-meter net earlier in September. The session provided many good tips for being a successful net control, and even more important, it provided tips for handling the unexpected.

Besides the technical sessions, there were many commercial vendors and manufacturer representatives in the hall, including HRO, ICOM, YAESU, KENWOOD, and several other companies. The swap meet was quite small, but it certainly had quality equipment for sale. W1AW/6 had a station set up, and radio amateurs were welcome to work from its station. The radio was an Icom 7600, and the antennas were outside the building on a tower on a trailer. The most important part of the convention was the chance to socialize with many interesting people, many friends, and, of course, radio operators that you hadn't met before. I strongly recommend that you make it a point to attend an ARRL convention to take advantage of the many offerings.

I almost forgot to tell you that I actually won a major raffle prize. You may hear me on the air soon with my brand-new Yaesu VX-7R.

Our October 14 meeting of the AARC was interesting. Besides seeing a slideshow of the AARL Southwestern Convention in San Diego, the club program focused on use of CW. We saw the video of the Jay Leno "Tonight Show" in which Jay conducted a contest between a pair of CW operators and a pair sending cell phone text messages, and, of course, the CW operators were able to send and receive their messages much quicker than the texters could. You may have seen this clip before, but it is certainly as enjoyable in a replay as it was the first time it was seen. We also were introduced to the incident in which the Princendam, one of Holland America's cruise ships, was saved in an emergency situation which required the use of CW. We heard, and several of the members copied, the actual CW communications between the Princendam and several other ships. One could feel the realism of the situation by doing this, a realism that is not possible by just hearing about the incident.

Congratulations are in order for two new techs and a new general who successfully passed tests at the September VE testing session. One of the three enthusiastic new licensees even checked into the Thursday night 2-meter club net.



CHAPTER 16

BARRY M. GOLDWATER ARIZONA CHAPTER

At our October 2nd luncheon meeting I had the pleasure of presenting some information about my association with the MCSO (Maricopa County Sheriff's Office) Communications Posse. The Communications Posse is one of a few hundred posses that support MCSO. There are more than 3,000 volunteers in the Posse presently, making Maricopa County's Posse the largest all-volunteer organization in the nation. Members of the MCSO Posse receive many hours of excellent training in all aspects of law enforcement from the Office free of charge. Since joining the Posse I have received a great deal of very interesting training.

Unlike many of the Posse units who are tied to a certain geographic area, the Communications Posse covers the entire County. It is involved in providing interagency communications during multi agency details like DUI enforcement. We direct traffic for special events, for which we receive payment from the event organizers. This income helps to cover some of our operating costs. During the Christmas season we participate in shopping mall patrol details. All details must be conducted under the supervision of a sworn deputy sheriff. Our main activity centers around providing communications support for the search and rescue details in Maricopa County. All members of our Posse are licensed Amateur Radio Operators, which is also a requirement for membership in our Posse. We maintain radio communications with each search team from the time they leave the command post until they return following the completion of their search assignments. We relay information as it is made available during the search effort about what the teams are encountering in the field. This information is given to the Incident Commander for the search so he can make important decisions about how to proceed with the search. We are also responsible for signing all of the search teams' members in and out of the detail. We gather information about their qualifications and special equipment and pass it on to the Incident Commander so he knows what resources are available for him to utilize. I am including a couple of pictures of our communications van which would typically be located at the command post for the search.

welcome to join us during our weekly net on the Thompson Peak Repeater 448.825 (-) 100.0 Hz PL on Tuesday evenings weekly at 8:00 P.M. 


