That's it from me this month. Hope to see many of you in Yuma. It'll be great!



Watch Your [Ham Speak] Language! Talking to non-Hams at W7ASC.

We probably all agree that we volunteer at W7ASC for our own pleasure, to show and tell visitors about Amateur radio and to do a bit of recruiting.

In a prior newsletter you read that the National average is about one Ham for every 390 citizens in the U.S. Arizona is close to the National average, but the Science Center visitors probably tend to a slightly higher number of Hams. Just for the sake of this Article, let us agree that we see about one Ham in 250 visitors to the Ham Shack (excuse me, Amateur Radio Station). The obvious conclusion is that there are 249 people who know little or nothing about Amateur radio. As they look our way and a puzzled look appears, we have just a fleeting moment in which to connect and engage. Remembering that we are seeking to entertain and recruit, what do we say?

"Hi, there! Look what we have here. We are running our Gonsu 888 into a stacked Yogi-Bera and we have tweaked it down to less that two to one Ess- war. We are on HF using USB PSK 31 on twenty meters. Just worked some rare VR9 DX on the long path in-spite of Q-Arem and should be receiving a Quesl card before long."

"If that doesn't get you excited, we can show you what PISK 33 looks like, right here on the computer screen. Wanna try it?"

The Visitor will obviously want to know the location of the next VE test session so that they can obtain their very own Ham License, knowing that they can later file for a Vanity call. Or maybe legally eat a Ham Sandwich.

OK - you probably get the point here. A famous movie line applies very well. "What we got here is a failure to communicate."

This is a typical Human trait. Almost all groups use their own special "slanguage." It develops almost without intention. Airlines do not fly planes - they use "equipment" and they do not count the number of passengers, but measure the load factor.

The car service guy does it too. The frammis is worn, thus requiring the replacement of the boot on the knibbling pin. And in another 3k you must bring it in so that they can contabulate the Encabulator. [Jean has been listening to too much "Car Talk" on PBS]

Whoa, Nellie! Back to the original objective. Do we want to impress the visitor with our special speech capability, or do we wish to interest them in Amateur radio? Even the term "Ham Shack" has meaning to Hams, but not to others. Really. As an exercise for the student: Where did "Ham" come from? What did it originally mean? Answers are in the back of the book.

It is important to watch your language and the choice of words when attempting to start a conversation with the vast majority of the visitors. Work to bridge the gap between what they know and what we are trying to impart. Showing the latest QST to a non-Ham creates an impression that Amateur radio is for a special breed (old) of highly (fat) trained geeks. Flip through those pages and read them as if you never heard of radio. What do they tell you?

This is clearly a challenge. Think before you speak and select your script with care. Asking a young person if they are interested in obtaining a Ham license usually results in a blank expression or a quick exit. What? A license for a Ham[burger]? Do you entice a visitor with an offer of a Queso? Or show all of our Quesls? That has a lot of >yawn< appeal to a youngster. Instead, tell the visitor that we have talked to more than 100 different countries and show the cards that we exchange with the other operators. Work to extend the conversation from what they know to what you are trying to say.

We should call attention to the fine Superstition ARC Newsletter that has been streaming from Dave, K7AV. Called "The Communicator," it certainly lives up to that title. See

If you are not on Dave's mailing list, take whatever steps are required to be included.

More next time on how to bridge the gap and how to improve communications (in spite of Strother Martin) with non-hams.

More than once I have been approached by my non-ham friends who asked me whether ham radio was still around or whether it is dying a sure death because of the development and widespread use of cell phones, computers, and other sophisticated electronic devices. What do you think? Is amateur radio dying? Obviously not. Last week I received an email from Joe Cutitta, WØSLL, who has been one of the session managers for VE testing in the Arizona Amateur Radio Club. His email included a spreadsheet with a report on the numbers of VE's we have in Arizona and the number of test sessions in which each has participated. There are 779 VE's in Arizona. In the AARC the following VE's have been active in testing, and the number of test sessions is included after each VE's name:

These people have been instrumental in licensing many new ham radio operators. Why do these members spend the time and effort as volunteer examiners? They not only enjoy the satisfaction of the experiences as amateur operators and wish to pass along a chance to others to experience this, but they also see the great value of amateur radio during emergencies. Computers and cell phones may not function during drastic emergencies, but amateur radio has been proven to do the job. It might be interesting to you, as it has been to me these past months, to listen on Sunday mornings at 7:30 A.M. on 3990 kHz to the RACES net and every afternoon at 5:30 P.M. on 3986 kHz to the Arizona Traffic and Emergency Net. During these nets several dedicated amateurs give time and energy to passing traffic in order to develop and maintain message handling skills which would be needed in time of emergencies. When cell towers are down and computers lose their AC power because of an emergency situation, amateur radio stations will still operate independently with their emergency power.

Yes, amateur radio is still alive, and its numbers are growing. As of December 27, 2011, there were 746,800 amateur radio operators in the U.S. A year ago that number was 735,084, and two years ago there were 727,885 hams in the US. Amateur radio does not seem to be overly challenged by iphones, ipads and other "i-things."

It is interesting to note recent positive interest in amateur radio by our national media. This was pointed out in a recent ARRL bulletin, but it deserves mention here. "Last Man Standing," a TV series which made its debut this season, features Tim Allen as Mike Baxter, KAØXTT. On January 17, Mike is shown having a QSO on the show using his ICOM IC-9100 HF/6/2meter transceiver and an IC-92AD handheld transceiver as well as a Comet CRV-5X HF dipole and GP-1 antenna for 2 meters and 70 cm.

In a movie called "Journey 2: The Mysterious Island," which will be released on February 18, the plot hinges on Amateur Radio when a coded distress signal comes from a mysterious island where no island should exist. In the summer of 2011, two movies featured Amateur Radio: "Mr. Popper's Penguins" and "Super 8."

Finally, on December 15, "Jeopardy" featured amateur radio in its category "Pastimes." The contestant's \$800 question was "The FCC assigns call signs like N8DNR to use in this hobby." The correct response was, of course, "What is ham radio?"

Perhaps recent media hype has a positive influence on the popularity of amateur radio. Or has media realized that the popularity of amateur radio justifies its inclusion in media productions?

Our club activities continue. Hopefully we will announce the date of the AARC Hamfest in our next column. We are looking forward to a good one, and some of us are anxiously awaiting the Southwest Convention in Yuma in February.
