

Field Day with TBARC By Rick Tejera K7TEJ

Well, Field Day has come and gone and I hope everyone enjoyed it as much as I did. This was my first Field day and I spent it in Flagstaff with TBARC. Thanks to Jack Lundsford (KD7RCJ) for again offering his cabin for our use. The accommodations were first class and that made for the beginnings of a great weekend. I arrived Friday just as the 10-15-20 Meter tri-band beam was being assembled. Once the beam was together, we raised the tower and got the beam ready to go. The plan was to run three rigs, one on each band through a triplexer, supplied by Gary WK7B. At first it seemed ok, but we'd later find out that the triplexer wasn't working as hoped. Fortunately we were able to 10m on Steve W1ADW's Station and 20/15 off the beam. We also had a 40/ 80 meter station and CW & Digital Stations. Gary also set up a VHF station to work 6m. The plan was to run 4A. Set up was complete by early afternoon on Friday. After a pizza dinner, I sat down at the 20m station and gave the station a "Shakedown" on 20m. The Beam was pointing NE and that gave me a pipe into Europe. I worked Italy, Czech Republic & Austria, my first Phone DX contacts. Had to work through the pileups to get them, but it was worth it.

Saturday came and at 1800UT the fun began in earnest. I was amazed how quickly the bands filled up. It was tough to find a spot to call CQ, so I spent the first hour or so on 20-M, answering CQ. Eventually I was able to settle into a spot and was on the good end of the pile up. After a while we got a few of the youngsters on the air. Bianca Reinalda W7BCR and her brother Japser (just licensed two weeks) KF7WFD. Both worked about ½ each on 15 meter phone. Isaac Stembridge, who is not yet licensed, worked 15 meter phone with his dad Bryan N7BES, just as 15 meters picked up. Isaac worked the pile up for at least an hour and was racking up contacts at 70/hour. Quite the feat for someone so young. 15 meters was surprisingly open. We made contacts though 2200 local. The night continued at a slower but steady pace though about 0100 Sunday.

It would've been nice to get some shuteye then, but I waited till 0200 to try to get the satellite bonus as SO-50 was coming over the hill then. I wasn't optimistic; given SO-50 is a tough bird to word under good conditions, let alone the chaos that would be Field day. SO-50 put out only 0.25 watt on the

downlink and it tumbles so using a linearly polarized antenna is an exercise in arm twisting. Factor in my station is an HT and it was going to be a tough call. As I expected the pass was full of alligators, folks not fully up on sat ops calling CQ, stepping on everyone and I'll guess in many cases operating simplex. During the whole 12 minute pass, I got in and heard someone call me, but again got steppe d on and was never quite able to complete a contact. In fact, I don't think I ever heard anyone complete a QSO. Next year I plan on setting up an SSB station and working the linear birds.

I certainly enjoyed the weekend and fellowship of the folks in TBARC who have helped me become a better operator. For me though, the best part of the weekend was elmering the kids. It was fun watching them learn and enjoy making contact across the US & even some DX. This is what Field Day is all about.

A big thank you to all who helped make Field Day a success. Hope everyone else had as good a time as we did.



THE "SILENT SERVICE" COMES THROUGH AGAIN

The W7ASC Station was up and running on a Saturday a while back. It was one of those rare days in Arizona; it had been raining. Off-roaders found the trails to be fairly sloppy and hardly typical.

A CQ originated from a remote area. A truck was stuck in the mud. The Ham who was at the wheel was asking for someone to call for a tow in order that he could be extricated.

The Ham volunteers at W7ASC offered to help. The station had that big signal into the repeater, a phone in the station, and station computers that could search the Internet for service providers. The driver of the marooned truck was very happy that he had a Ham ticket.

First order of business was to pin down his location. Since he was an experienced driver, he had his maps with him and was able to identify the road and the section markers. The W7ASC station operators pulled a map up from the Internet. His position was no longer a mystery. The Station operators prepared to search for a tow for that truck. This was a Saturday, so many Tow providers would be closed. But before even the first phone call was initiated, another Ham called in on the repeater to determine if he might provide some assistance. He thought that he might be somewhere near to that Ham who needed help.

W7ASC turned the frequency over to the two stations that were out there in the wild.

As luck and Ham radio, would have it, the two operators were less than a mile apart. And the second Amateur had a big 4-wheel truck that was equipped with a winch. Ham Radio saved the day!

In the fine tradition of the Silent Service, very few people were aware of this little incident. For Amateurs, this is not unusual or exceptional. It happens all of the time.

Here is another one, also an off-road story.

A 4-wheeler ran into a problem in a remote area north of Phoenix. He slid off the trail, ran into an obstacle and smashed the truck radiator. That truck was no longer able to move. But the driver was a Ham and had his rig with him. His CQ was heard at W7ASC. What he wanted was a phone patch to his XYL. No problem! They were shortly connected. The driver gave his wife instructions. They included directions to a parts store and a list of materials that he required in order to get rolling again. They used the phone since she was not licensed.

While he was waiting for the XYL rescue party to arrive,

other people came along and saw his problem. Some tried to call via cell phone [No signal, too remote]. Some had CB [Useless]. One hiker, trying to solve the problem, said that he would climb out of the valley where this was taking place. The plan was to find a Cell phone signal and get help. The Ham tried to explain that, since he was a Ham, there was no communication problem. The folks wanted to help, but did not understand the power of Amateur radio.

The Ham's XYL arrived, the radiator was installed and the truck was back in service, all as the helpful cell phone user returned to report that he was still unable to find a signal. He was amazed that the parts had arrived, the truck was repaired, and all without a cell phone connection.

No surprise to the Volunteers who had been keeping the frequency open. It did make a good story for those ASC visitors who could grasp the details.

Just a week ago, that Ham's XYL visited the W7ASC Arizona Science Center station. She now has her own ticket. She was happy to hear that we planned to publish a short piece about the incident that gave her the push needed for her to study, pass the test and now have her very own call sign.

There you have it - two little stories that are really no surprise to the Amateur community. Very few non-Amateurs will see this, and, of those who do, few will understand what happened here.
