Hi Guys,

The program for the September general meeting was a great presentation by Carl Foster, KE7AZ, on antennas. He went through an in depth explanation on how antennas work and why. He showed us some terrific ideas for "Stealth antennas" for home owners' associations. I am sure a lot of guys who are in HOA's are going to put his ideas to work.

Bonnie and I finally got a chance to get out of town and away from the desert heat. We took a week or so and went to Northern California to see the coast and the big trees. We took our travel trailer and did a lot of camping along the way. We have a habit of talking back and forth while we are driving. This sometimes leads to unplanned U turns because we sail right by the exit we are looking for. But it also leads to not paying attention to the gas gauge. Our trip took us to Las Vegas and on to Reno. That is a long stretch of Nevada desert and as it turned out a lack of gas stations. We got to Mina about 8:00 P.M. and no gas stations. I asked a police officer we found where the nearest stations were. He said about 40 miles in Hawthorne. We spent the night there and the next morning I tried to get Bonnie to drive. In fact they were still fighting the wild fire and we got some up close and personal pictures of the fire. According to the TV, there were five or six major wild fires in the area that night. We thought about that every time we stopped to camp somewhere.

We finally got to Willits and stayed for a few days. We drove through the most beautiful redwood forest along a twisting mountain road to Fort Bragg. The town has not changed since our last trip. It is a quaint costal town with many shops and restaurants. The temperature was only 60 degrees and we were not prepared for that. There were not very many people on the beach areas and the ones that were there were in heavy jackets. It seems like every time we come over here we forget that it could be way less than 110 degrees. We also noticed some new signs warning of a possible tsunami. We were told these signs were put up after the Japanese tsunami. A rather sobering thought.

From Willits, we went North to Crescent City and spent another four days. The National Redwood Forest is really something to see. The costal fog and mist made the forest into a surreal alien landscape of indescribable dimensions. The roadway follows along the natural grade and dodges around the huge trees. The park has provided very few parking areas but they are near hiking trails. There were towering trees with hanging moss and giant ferns that make you feel very small and insignificant. I can't wait until the next time we go there.

If you have never been there, I hope you get the chance. You will truly enjoy the shear beauty.

Finally, we had to head for home. This time we took the California freeway system instead of the Nevada desolation route. Much better. We also stopped into Laughlin for some fun. We didn't come away with a fortune, but we didn't lose the ranch either. All in all this was a fun trip and we are looking forward to the next one.

The only radio we had with us was the dual band in the truck. Sadly, there were very few guys on their repeaters. We should have taken the HF. Oh well. Next time.

Gonna start off this month a bit off topic, though if we really need a tie in to radio, the interest in Science and things technical was inspired by the man I admired and called my hero when I was a boy:

When I was 9, if you asked most of my friends who their heroes were, you'd have heard names like Tom Seaver, Bobby Murcer, Joe Namath. Me? Neil A. Armstrong. I had been fascinated by Space travel since I could remember and the guys who flew these ships were like Gods to me. I wanted to be them in the worst way. I read everything I could about Space travel to the point I knew more than my teachers. I knew all the astronauts' names and their crew assignments, and I knew the mission objectives. And like most people, I watched in awe as a grainy black & white image of Neil Armstrong made his way to the lunar surface.

When I heard the news of Armstrong's passing, a wave of sadness came over me, of course his legacy is forever established in American history, Indeed World history, but it goes further with me. His accomplishments triggered a lifelong interest in Aviation & Science that still lives on in me. Since that day in July 1969, I can't look at the moon without remembering that people have actually been there. And I look to the future with the disappointment of knowing that the remaining eight men who made the journey will most likely not live to see those who follow.

In many ways Armstrong was the perfect choice to be the

first, though his fate was not a matter of selection but really more a happenstance of random events. He was originally assigned as backup commander of Apollo 9, which at the time was scheduled to be a high earth orbit mission testing the lunar module & Command module. Based on the crew rotation established by Deke Slayton, the astronauts' boss, backup crews would rotate to a prime crew assignment three missions later, so he would nominally command Apollo 12. However, due to delays in production of the Lunar module and some Cold war politics, the Apollo 9 mission was swapped with Apollo 8, the profile was changed to send the ship around the moon, not just to high orbit without the LEM. This put him now in line for Apollo 11 and destiny. Again this chain of events was fortuitous, as among the astronauts, he lacked the typical bravado common among the astronaut corps, which brought a level of humility & dignity to the landing. He was also a civilian, which enabled NASA to dodge any

accusation that the mission had military

overtones.

His skill as a pilot was unquestioned. His only other flight was aborted due to a thruster malfunction that threatened to spin his ship (Gemini VIII) out of control. His quick actions save the spacecraft (and his & Pilot Dave Scott's) lives. On the landing of Apollo 11, he faced communications outages, computer alarms and then had to take over manual control of Eagle sooner than expected to find a suitable area to land when he saw the computer steering them into a boulder field. He landed with less than 20 seconds of fuel left. Afterwards, he said he was disappointed in what to him was sloppy flying. He also felt the landing was the most challenging part of the flight and that the Moonwalk was not nearly as challenging.

So as I remember July 20th, 1969 like it was yesterday, so will I remember August 25th, 2012. The day my hero flew home.

Godspeed Neil A. Armstrong!

We now return you to your regularly scheduled column. By the time you read this, the Emcomm Class will have taken place. I'll have attended, so I'll give a report next month on how it went. I expect it will be a valuable learning experience.

Speaking of EmComm, due to renovations at John C Lincoln North Mountain, our radio room, such that it was, is no more.
