BUSY TIMES AT THE STATION: HAMFESTS, SPRING BREAK, a continuing stream of visitors. School field day delivering bus loads of eager cherubs. In other words, pretty much normal. What was not normal was a shortage of volunteers. Various factors diminished the ranks of available Hams. If you were considering joining the volunteer Hams at W7ASC, this would be a good time to get started. Call Bob, KG7QJ@COX.NET and he will find a way to work around your availability.

If you were not on the air, you missed a fun event. On Saturday, 22 March, the Cochise county Boy Scouts put on a major educational event. This took place in Sierra Vista and the objective was Merit Badges. Two Ham stations were in operation. One station was on HF – they were heard, though not worked, at W7ASC on the ten-meter band.

The other station was on VHF, using the EAARS repeaters system. In order to obtain the Communication Merit badge, a candidate Scout must engage in a QSO for ten minutes. WE had been advised to expect 200 Scouts! Panic attack at the Shack. They forecast on-air activities from 0900 to 1700. MST. Their station, K2BSA/7, was a busy place, but they did NOT have 200 visiting Scouts all trying to get ten minutes air time.

There might have been that number at the total event, but there were other classes and demonstrations aimed at other badges. As a result, W7ASC, together with other on-air stations, was able to provide all of the support that was needed. At the station there were extra volunteers on duty. Special volunteers Thomas, KG7FXT, and Bob, KG7FXU, provided the extra help that made it possible to attend to the normal flow of Science Center visitors in addition to the on-air activity. And there was even a local Scout who came along in order to complete his ten-minute QSO as required for his Merit badge application. Thomas, KG7FXT, is a relatively new Ham, but he has his General, is 13 years old, and he worked the contacts as if he were much more experienced.

The Sierra Vista Scouts took a break for lunch. This gave the W7ASC crew a chance to catch a breath, grab a bite and complete the log entries that had fallen behind. While there was this short lull, another Ham got on the network and made an IRLP link into New Zealand. Three ZL1 stations were in QSO with the Arizona Ham while Volunteers and visitors read the mail. 73's were exchanged just in time to catch those Scouts returning from lunch.

A tip of the hat is due to the EAARS network that was used for most of the day. If you have not experienced this network, give it a try. Go to their web site and note all of the locations, frequencies and modes. This connects South East Arizona and western New Mexico. Great coverage, excellent audio and very nice people can be found on the network. No problem reaching Deming in order to get the latest word on the annual duck race.

Did you imagine that you have heard it all? Well – you have not.

W7ASC received three new(er) computers from a local company that is changing their internal system. Once these are installed, W7ASC will be able to install and demonstrate even more Ham-oriented programs. Drop by the station in order to see the change.

Speaking of programs, here is one that you might find useful. Most of us use QRZ when looking for the name behind a call sign. Great site! But if you want information that does not come with the QRZ report, try WWW.HAM.MASHMAP.COM which allows you to sort by ZIP or call sign.

The Amateur Technician class had its first session of 2014 and will be competed by the time that you read this. It was conducted, as it has been for many years, by (Professor) Bob KG7QJ. One of the students felt, after three classes, that he was sufficiently prepared to take the test. Why wait? He was correct, as he passed, got his call sign, but still came back to the class. When asked, he responded that he was still learning. The more that he learned, the better Ham he would become.

The secret C.A.R.L. BOD committee met in January, as required, selecting and announcing the C.A.R.L. Ham of the year. This meeting, held behind closed doors in a windowless room at an undisclosed location, has historically made a quick selection of that Volunteer who has logged the most hours at W7ASC. This year that same committee decided to recognize other activities that helped to operate the Station and perform all of the other duties required to meet the Station objectives. This is a more subjective approach, so it took more time. There was an eclectic slate of candidates, making the choice very close. The deciding factor was the ability to pipe Morse code on a Boson's pipe. That noosed KG7KJ into the top spot. The award ceremony was so touching that one could hardly observe a dry eye in the audience.

There is still some room for Volunteers on theW7ASC schedule, so do not delay. Call Bob KG7KJ at 480-961-1109, talk to the Ham of Year 2013 and get on the schedule. If you do not volunteer, you are unlikely to become a candidate for Ham of the Year 2015.

The results: the field strength meter has excellent sensitivity that was almost constant from 1.8 to 450 MHz.

To some extent that kind of building-it-yourself can still be a part of today's amateur radio. If you can rob the sugar bowl for \$1,159.90, you can buy the Elecraft K2 100-watt transceiver kit, saving you about \$250 by assembling it yourself. "Building Your Own Gear is Half the Fun! Imagine the feeling you will get from your first QSO when you tell the other operator that you built it yourself!"

The name of the club was changed to Youngtown-Sun City Amateur Radio Club.

Fifteen years later, in 1976, the membership had grown from the seven charter members to 125 on the roster. Today, 2014, we have 215 members.

## Wickenburg Hospital Antenna Project

Last week the West Valley ARC technical team finished the installation of a two meter yagi on the roof of the Wickenburg Community Hospital. This project arose from the hospital's desire to have a direct emergency link to the Del Webb hospital repeater.

A communications disruption in Wickenburg illustrated the danger of not having a link to the Del Webb hospital. As a result, the West Valley ARC team went up to the hospital and conducted an experiment to see if a direct link could be established between the Wickenburg Hospital and the Del Webb hospital repeater which is operated by the West Valley ARC. The test was successful and a suitable antenna, mast and installation protocol was established.

The week of March 23rd saw the team installing a 12 element 2 meter Yagi on a 20 foot pole using a fiberglass insulating section to allow vertical polarization. With help from the Wickenburg Hospital maintenance operation installing mounting brackets, we were able to connect up the antenna, pole, and coax hardline to the antenna.

It was critical to aim the beam directly at the Del Webb Hospital (33 miles away) to get a solid signal. Previous testing provided the proper direction and as a result, we finalized the installation and went down to the office to test the results. Using 25 watts, we were able to raise the Del Webb repeater, although not at full quieting. Increasing the output to 50 watts gave almost full quieting. Now the hospital has a direct link to Del Webb hospital should there be a widespread power failure or communications link failure in the Wickenburg area.

West Valley ARC members contributed antennas, hardline and regular coax, masts and expertise to assemble and install the antenna for the hospital.

The following people participated from the Wickenburg Commity Hospital participated in the project: Linda Brockwell KG7IKT (Chief Nursing Officer, Wickenburg Community Hospital), Roy Earls (Plant Operations Supervisor, Wickenburg Regional Health Center) and Al Gustin (Hospital Maintenance). The West Valley ARC technical team consisted of: Ted Walker KB5OF, Robert Fairfield K7RQN, Tim Hayes KF7XY, Bob Kettler WA6MIO, Bob Paul KG7FIL, Ken Jenkins WB6MMV, Patrick Blaylock W6SPS, Dave Porta WA0ZVM, and Randy Helfrich KD7ZAA.


