FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

Lots of things are happening in the world of Amateur Radio right now. There are bills before both houses of Congress which are essentially identical - H.R. 1301 for the US House and S. 1685 for the Senate. These bills require private landuse restrictions (HMOs, CC&Rs, deed restrictions, etc.) to follow the "reasonable accommodation" of Amateur Radio antennas allowing for Amateur Radio Communications.

In the ARRL Letter of July 16th, ARRL President Kay Craigie, N3KN stated in part:

". . . The Amateur Radio Parity Act of 2015 is aimed at helping to ensure the future of Amateur Radio, as more and more neighborhoods impose deed restrictions that prohibit Amateur Radio antennas and keep today's youngsters from becoming active radio amateurs.

"What if their parents have bought houses in neighborhoods with deed restrictions prohibiting antennas?" she speculated. "Those kids' interest in ham radio gained from school, Scouts, or family friends will have no way to blossom into the life-changing experience of being radio amateurs."

It's time for all of us to get involved by writing letters to our representatives, if you haven't already done so. Take copies of a letter addressed to each of your representatives to a club meeting and have everyone put their names, addresses and signatures on letters to each member of Congress. Then put them all together and send to the ARRL (c/o The Amateur Radio Parity Act, ARRL, 225 Main St, Newington, CT 0611) and they will hand deliver them to Capitol Hill.

They are listening. Let's really overwhelm them.

In other news for Arizona, Thomas Boza, NE7X is working with Senator Jeff Dial on getting \$17 of the license fee for Amateur Radio license plates returned to the Amateur Radio community. See his article on this page for more details and what you can do to help.

As I write this, it is one week until the ARCA/Williams Hamfest. It's looking to be exciting with the DX Store, RF Gear to Go, and RF Stuff all being in attendance. There will even be someone with event T-shirts this year. Seminars, meeting, talks, and a T-Hunt are scheduled for both Friday and Saturday. There will be an on-site Hospitality Suite Friday evening, and on Saturday, there will be a Balloon Launch and VE testing in the morning and the Annual Barbecue Dinner in the evening. QST from Thomas Boza, NE7X ARRL AZ Section Government Liaison

On June 24, 2015, Thomas Boza, NE7X, ARRL Arizona Section Government Liaison, met with Arizona State Senator Jeff Dial, Republican from District 18, at his office in the Arizona State Senate building, to discuss the process for acquiring \$17 from each Arizona Amateur Radio auto license plate fee, money to be used for college scholarships. Senator Dial, who is not an Amateur Radio operator himself, was very supportive and provided suggestions on the process to use in order to make this happen.

After going back to the relevant statute and confirming with John Carlson this morning, the reason the amateur radio special plates do not have a fund set up to receive money for college scholarships, is because current Arizona Amateur Radio auto license plates were among the earliest (possibly "the" earliest) to be created by statute—and the motivation behind them was, at that time, not yet for a source of revenue.

Whether or not to alter this is a matter of policy for the legislature to determine. But the way the newer ones are usually set up is that the organization receiving the money for distribution will pay an up-front payment of \$32,000 to cover the design/creation process and other costs. ADOT (Arizona Department Of Transportation) would want to be able to recover said costs, but given that the extensive design and creation process was already done when the plate was created, we don't imagine that would be anywhere near \$32,000 for this specific plate. Most likely the money required to design/create the amateur plates will probably not be needed since the plate printing/stamping has already been done.

We are starting the process now for the plate issue so it will introduced in January when the State Session comes back in session. MORE INFORMATION WILL FOLLOW. For now, please wait, we will let you know what you as an amateur will need to do in the near future concerning letters, emails and phone calls to your state representatives. Once the issue has been resolved, all money received from this would go to ARCA (Amateur Radio Council of Arizona) for scholarship distribution.

























Follow-up on W7MOT-14 (UHF) 442.975 MHz and W7MOT-15 (900 MHz) 927.4375 MHz. Repeaters are fully operational atop Chandler Regional Hospital. Site Mgr is TD Kennard. N7ISR.

The August meeting presentation will be Ron Peters, WB9EXL, speaking about the latest developments for Fusion and the W7MOT Fusion for General Dynamics.

Field Day 2015. MARCA operated 2A from Gentry Fire Tower Camp ground, located on the Mogollon Rim at an elevation of 7400 ft, east of Forest Lakes overlooking Black Canyon Lake. Operations included 80 thru 6 meters using SSB, CW and digital PSK31 modes. Power was provided by batteries and solar chargers. The GOTA had both non-ham and inactive ham operators.

A lightning storm passed through the area Saturday afternoon and initiated safety shutdown of all station activity for a few hours. Cooler temps accompanying the storm had everyone scrambling for winter jackets.

Friday began with a small advance antenna team who

Work focuses on the set up of two main HF stations, one 6-meter, and a GOT station. Both paper and computers are used for logging QSOs.

Our most active FD operator was AARC member Steve Tolnai, W7WSV, who made 319 contacts. The Geissler family, Reinhard (DL1UF) and Ingrid (W7ISG) were 2nd and 3rd in activity. DL1UF logged 102

contacts; W7ISG logged 97. I was next on the activity list. I logged a measly 66 contacts and spent two hours of sleep on the hard floor in the middle of the night.

The 7th annual pilgrimage of 4x4 Hams to the Mogollon Rim for ARRL Field Day 2015 took place in June. A few arrived Thursday afternoon, but most of the crew rolled in Friday afternoon or Saturday morning. At 7250 ft. elevation, the high temperatures are 40-50 degrees less than Phoenix. An abundance of rain this year also resulted in no fire restrictions on the Coconino National Forest.

On Friday evening, we tied a heavy tent stake to a rope and tossed it over the branches in the pine trees approximately 40ft up. The 102' G5RV we used was hoisted into place and coax run over to where the operating canopy was erected. Except for a few minutes to connect radios on Saturday morning, we were ready to go.

Saturday morning saw several more hams pull into camp. At 9:00 a.m., we gathered around several tables and held a VE testing session. At the conclusion of the session, we welcomed a new Technician to the ranks as well as one member who upgraded to General.

Next, the radios were set up and Field Day was underway. As in previous years, we elected to operate as a 1A to keep the radio as active as possible and allow everyone to rotate around and get on the microphone. We normally operate as two-man teams to allow one person to use the radio while the other works the laptop making log entries. Each team rotated after an hour or so on the air. This system has worked well in the past, and didn't disappoint this year either. The radio was kept active throughout the afternoon.

Around 6:00 p.m. on Saturday, it was time to eat! The campfire was started and food set up on a table. Radio? What radio? The entire party circled the campfire and roasted hot dogs. Pasta, chips, beans, and all kinds of delicious homemade side dishes were served. We even had cookies and cheesecake for desert.

Around 8:00 p.m., a few intrepid hams headed back over to the radio. Not long after, a rainstorm blew in and we packed up the electronics vs. risking getting them wet. As I went to sleep around 9:00 p.m., a very close and loud crack of lightning hit. Good thing the radios were stowed!

Overall, we made 146 contacts on 20m and 40m, working mostly West Coast stations. There were twenty-six 4x4 Hams who attended this year with about half camping out the whole weekend. This year, we had much fewer contacts than in years past, but it was also the first year since 2009 that we were allowed to have a campfire. In keeping with the intent of Field Day, we set up a provisional station and had a great time operating under improvised conditions. More importantly, we also enjoyed friendship and ham radio fellowship around the campfire.

HF is alive and well with the summertime propagation with us again. Twenty meter Gray Line (the sunrise and sunset lines as they cross the globe) seem to be the best bet for propagation into Europe and the South Pacific from here. Europe in the mornings and the South Pacific in the evenings and even into the later hours. But other openings are happening as well. So don't be shy about turning on the HF rig and take a listen.

I like late evenings best (after 9:00 p.m.) as the east coast stations are in bed, which gives us here a better chance of being heard. I find DX stations calling for west coast stations quite a bit (they seem to consider "7's" as west coast). I use a DX spotting network (www.dxwatch.com) to help with spots and it comes in handy when the bands are crowded.

Last week, I became involved in a three way round table with a W7 in Washington State and some friends of his in New Zealand. I got a 59 from the Washington station and from the ZL2 station as well. With an attic beam pointed north and my 500 watts, if I can do it, almost anyone can. Longer wire antennas with modest power levels are getting good reports from DX stations as well, so that may be worth a try if you don't have a tower and beam.


