Hanging Out on the HF Bands

I like hanging out on the HF bands. Sunspots are still pretty active and unless Ole Sol acts up with a flair or whatnot, the HF bands are still in pretty good shape. Mornings on 10 - 15 - 20 are usually good for Europe and an occasional Russian or Ukraine station. You can hear some rare ones like Guernsey, off the English coast or the guy with the big new antenna on Crete in the Mediterranean. It's always fun searching for a rare or new one.

Afternoons and early evenings bring the Japanese, south Pacific and Australia and New Zealand stations on the bands along with Asiatic Russia and an occasional mainland China station (those are exciting).

There is this Italian station on 40 meters that must be running a zillion watts as he is S-9+ most evenings calling the US.

The DX spotting web sites (one is www.dxwatch.com) are always a big help for me in finding the right frequency or the right band and letting you know who is on.

Contesting has become a favorite of mine, not so much because I want to run up a big score but because there are so many stations on and picking up a new country or renewing acquaintenances with a radio friend on the other side of the world. is much easier. Those contacts are usually short but not always.

I well remember a wonderful 30 minute rag chew with a fellow in New Zealand who lived on a high bluff on the South Island near the town of Christchurch. I looked him up on QRZ while we were talking and got to ask questions about his house, antenna and equipment while looking at the pictures of them that he had posted.

Sometimes when you listen, it seems that hardly anyone is on. But often, these days the propagation is good, but no one is calling because they don't hear anyone. You might try a CQ or five and see who responds.

If you have an antenna that is suitable (towers are nice but not required) or just want to listen some, tune to the HF bands and search around some. I think you will be pleasantly surprised at what you find. I definitely recommend it.

The W7ASC Experience

HAMS – YES, YOU! - are good communicators – with other Hams. Consider the time that you spend on air, at meetings and at Hamfests. Breakfasts and other food events, such as picnics, are attended by other Hams. Whether it is a Net, a QSO or a contact via psk31, the operator on the other end is almost always a Ham. So, while you spend a lot of time talking about Ham radio that is almost always within the chorus of licensees. There is nothing wrong there, but there are actually a lot of people who never hear about Ham radio.

One exception is W7ASC, located at the Arizona Science Center, operated by Ham volunteers. There are a few other similar stations around the country, but W7ASC is, so far as we know, the only one like it in Arizona. The C.A.R.L. Organization celebrates 20 years of public operation this year (see the CARL certificate attached).

Volunteers at the station spend most of their shifts speaking to non-Hams. These volunteers need to avoid using the jargon that is the normal Ham-speak, as the visiting public has no idea what it is that they are hearing. The average visitor spends about ten minutes in the Shack. The Volunteer wants to use this time to create a lasting, pleasant, and accurate impression about Ham radio with that visitor.

That can be a challenge when the visitor arrives with misinformation. It is not unusual for a parent to introduce a child to the station with some statement that is clearly in error. "Look, Johnny! This is Morse code that is a secret way of sending messages" or "Ayup! Here is a typical CB station."

Some people get closer to the facts, but almost all think of Ham radio as an obsolete activity. Few know that Ham operators are licensed and regulated. Even fewer have any idea of the public service that is provided by Hams and that there are no taxpayer funds involved. Volunteers, who have spent some time at the station, come to understand that Hams have done a poor job of informing the non-Ham public about the important Public Service that is being performed for them.

The Volunteer corps at W7ASC has a very large challenge. Those volunteers are only a small percent of the Ham population. The non-Ham visitors to the station are, in turn, only a small percentage of the general population. Is it any wonder that our HOA's, and legislators, view Ham radio as a nuisance? Where would they hear otherwise? The general impression seems to be that a Ham is an oddball with no redeeming characteristics or qualities. When an attorney for the HOA management companies advises the City council that relaxing the antenna rules would result in 200 foot towers sprouting in every Ham backyard, Council members are inclined to accept that as highly probable. Ham radio – who needs it?

What is the message here? Devote some of your time to spreading the good word about the value of Ham radio. Speak up, and not just to other Hams. If you cannot volunteer at W7ASC, give talks and demonstrations wherever, and whenever, you find the opportunity. When your club has an Event, invite your neighbors and friends. Get help, if needed. Find the Science teacher at the local school and offer a short demonstration and talk. If you can hit a repeater, the volunteers at W7ASC will usually be glad to cooperate on-air, possible with Science Center visitors.

Be creative, be outgoing and work at it. Our privileges did not arrive through the pages of the Scriptures. Consider being a missionary, and think it to be a part of your Public Service obligation to inform the general public about the benefits that they derive from Ham radio. Even if you cannot, or will not, volunteer at W7ASC, take the time to visit and bring friends and family. The volunteers at W7ASC are actually doing a job for you. Show them some support!

In other news The Arizona Science Center held its annual Volunteer Appreciation event May 2. This year it was a breakfast, a presentation ceremony and a visit to the Planetarium. Just another fringe benefit from Volunteering.

The Center for Amateur Radio Learning celebrates its 20th anniversary in June 2015. We still have a couple of old timers that volunteer!



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It is an honor to be the president of the Arizona Repeater Association. The organization has a rich history that goes back more than 40 years before I earned my Technician license. I've spent some time recently sorting through the boxes of files and old Squelch Tail publications. I hope to scan and share some of those with you in the future. Packed away in boxes, I've unearthed the very first board meeting minutes from September 1967. After the board and officer selection took place, the vote was cast to name the organization Arizona Repeater Association, Inc. rather than Sun Valley Radio Club, Inc. Next to the minutes was the Certificate of Incorporation from the state of Arizona.

September. 25, 1967 Minutes.

At the April board meeting, Dennis KE7EJF announced that the Monday Night Swap Net on the CalZona system would be discontinued soon. This was sad news to see it end, but with internet sites such as eBay and Craig's List, selling equipment via a swap net has become a dwindling activity. In many recent weeks, the net has had none or at most, 1-2 listings. I tuned in on April 6 to hear an impressive swap net. After net control announced the planned end of the net in the future weeks, he collected several listings before pausing to query to see how many stations were listening. The net that night ended with 41 stations checking in and 15 listings. Overall, it was too little, too late and the Monday Night Swap Net was terminated after the April 27th net. The FCC/ARRL report stated that there are record numbers of hams, 729,624 licenses in the USA with 18,523 of those located in Arizona. I was able to help add one more to the ranks in early April. Paul KE7HR, James N7ELL, and I administered Element 2 to a young prospect that has difficulty reading. With his parents and brother banished to another room, we sat around the kitchen table reading him the test questions. I was excited and nervous for him as he selected mostly right, but a few wrong answers. I wanted to yell out "Hertz" when he answered the unit of measure for frequency is "Henry." We scored the test and he passed! This was a very rewarding experience and I was glad I was able to be there to help.

For the last several weeks, every time I go out in my garage, I trip over this big pile of equipment that Lance KW7LH and Cole AA7RD sent my way. Radios, filters, racks, shelving, and cables all destined for the mountaintop. The ARA is adding a site on Mingus Mountain to expand Rimlink and Metrolink along I-17 and coverage for Prescott, Cottonwood, and Sedona. Mike KF7MBK came over the other night and we were working on getting everything assembled for testing when my son came out to help. He's 3 1/2 years old and I'm very proud to see him taking an interest in amateur radio.





That is 160 hours 38 minutes. They traveled 6,646 miles landing just offshore at Baja California. The capsule was picked up by a Mexican fishing boat. There was only one minor injury. The equipment Paul installed worked exceptionally well. The balloonists and the ground personnel at mission control knew where they were every foot of the way. Great program Paul.

If you looked at these contests, you may have noticed that the implied goal is to achieve a high score and the score is usually computed by multiplying the QSO total value by a total multiplier value. The value assigned to each QSO is usually 1, but may vary sometimes 2, as in the ARRL contests for cw QSO's vs 1 for ssb QSO's, or a higher number for the higher frequency band QSO's in the ARRL VHF Contest. The multipliers may be assigned for new sections or countries or call letter prefixes (in the CQ WW WPX Contest).

And the multipliers may be applied for each band or for the whole contest. For instance, if you operate in the ARRL January VHF Contest and make 10 contacts (QSO's where you exchange call letters and grid square numbers for each) all on 2 meters FM in 5 grid squares your total score would be 50.

Remember you can always casually participate in these contests - most any contest - spent a few minutes or a few hours to become familiar with the events. Actually only a minority (typically 10% to 25%) of the operators are really serious contestants and most will be happy to take a few moments to help out newbies - we all have been newbies.


President's Column

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
