

The Arizona Repeater Association is a little different than your standard amateur radio club. As I've mentioned in previous columns, our primary focus is maintaining repeaters for emergency and public service uses. We host a monthly general membership meeting that's a social gathering with an educational presentation following. Beyond that, we are not focused on hosting our own hamfests and social gatherings.

The ARA repeater sites are kept on air by commercial power with most of them having generator or battery backup. In a disaster, the goal is for them to remain operational for days or even weeks. Our repeater site status has been added to our web site at the following link - https://www.w7ara.org/location/ If you ever hear any problems with ARA repeaters or interference, we ask that you please collect as much data as you can and submit an Interference Report at this link - https://www.w7ara.org/public/InterferForm.Aspx

The ARA has agreements with many organizations for use of our repeaters. If a disaster such as Hurricane Katrina were to happen in Arizona, Maricopa County Department of Emergency Management has priority to assign use of ARA repeaters.

In 2013, we began a relationship with the Daisy Mountain Fire Department. They had a location and grant money to install a repeater, but needed the expertise to get it on the air and continue maintenance. This was a great opportunity for both organizations. When the Daisy Mountain repeater went live in January 2014, the ARA Metrolink coverage was expanded and DMFD now had a home for their amateur radio segment of the CERT program.

AEN-MAR (Arizona Emergency Net – Maricopa) and MCECG (Maricopa Emergency Communication Group) are two other groups you'll hear regularly using ARA repeaters. Each Monday evening, AEN-MAR meets on Metrolink for training and exercise in the public service communication arts. AEN-MAR also activates due to severe storms and other criteria throughout the year. MCECG can be heard using ARA repeaters on many of the almost 50 public service events they support each year.

Skywarn weather spotters also have a home on ARA repeaters. Coconino County Skywarn has a weekly net on the Mt. Elden 146.98 MHz repeater each Monday evening. The Coconino County ARES group gathers on Wednesday evenings for their weekly net. Pinal County Skywarn meets every Tuesday on Rimlink.

Join any of the groups mentioned above and get involved. If you're interested in learning about or helping maintain a repeater site, stop by one of the ARA technical meetings on the first Thursday of each month.

License Testing Information

When you are ready to take an exam for an Amateur Radio license, there are Volunteer Examiners available to assist you. Each Applicant will need to bring a picture ID (some test sessions require two forms of identification). If you are upgrading your class of license, be sure to bring the original (and a copy) of your license and/or Certificate of Successful Completion of Examination (C.S.C.E.). There may be a fee required.



If you could actually squeeze a complete description of Ham radio into one conversation, new things would have sprung up while you were lecturing. Further, many visitors are nontechnical. They probably carry a cell phone, but are astonished when you mention that it is a radio device. Every Volunteer must be prepared to engage with the lowest common denominator of the public "technical understanding." Much of what they believe that they know is dead wrong. Their Microwave oven is NOT nuclear. They have been sold on the idea that they should consume only food that is not from Genetically Modified Organisms (GMS). FYI corn, wheat, cattle, etc. all were genetically modified over 3,000 years ago. When you try to explain that all living things are genetically modified, even their children, you have lost them. That, Oh Brave Volunteer, is your challenge when you are on duty at America's Ham station.

Your faithful scribe has dubbed W7ASC as America's Ham station. It is one of the few locations where a fully operational station, staffed by real Hams, is open to the public. Perhaps there are others, but the station at the Arizona Science Center has been on display for TWENTY YEARS Thousands of people now know at least something about Ham radio. It may not be comprehensive, but it is at least, we hope, accurate. The Station does not exist for the benefit of a small cadre of Hams. It exists in an attempt to bridge the knowledge gap between the vast body of Ham operators and the public that they serve. It is a rare visitor who realizes that HAMS are licensed by the FCC, a Federal Agency. Fewer still know that our license clearly identifies us as an Amateur Radio SERVICE. For good reason. To paraphrase Rodney, we rarely get respect. Every Ham within reach should take a turn volunteering at America's Ham Shack in order to build some respect in the eyes of the public. Not just for yourself, but for all Hams.

And here are a few tips for your time in front of the public. Forget the Ham jargon. Use language that engages the non-Ham. Rare DX? UHF? PSK31? Sideband? Clear on your final? The visitor is made to feel like an outsider (which, of course, they are) to a closed society. Demonstrate what can be done, but do not start with the inner working of the rigs. Bring the visitor into the sanctum – do not leave them standing, with nose pressed against the window,



I especially would like to thank those that donated items for the Auction. Thank you for those of you who used the Auction to sell some of your "stuff." We are very glad to be of service to you as well.



Contest Corner

The February/March period is the most exciting part of the annual typical contest year. This year I find about twelve world class contests that may interest us casual contesters:

Feb. 28 – North American QSO Party, rtty

Mar., 6 – ARRL Intl. DX Contest, ssb

Mar. 27 - CQ WW WPX Contest, ssb

Detail sconcerning these contests and more can be found at the WA7BNM web site: http://www.hornucopia.com/contestcal/contestcal.html. When you go to the web site, left click on the "+" sign in the left margin to see more information.

If you looked at these contests, you may have noticed that the implied goal is to achieve a high score and the score is usually computed by multiplying the QSO total value by a total multiplier value. The value assigned to each QSO is usually 1, but may vary – sometimes 2, as in the ARRL contests for cw QSO's vs 1 for ssb QSO's, or a higher number for the higher frequency band QSO's in the ARRL VHF Contest.

The multipliers may be assigned for new sections or countries or call letter prefixes (in the CQ WW WPX Contest). And the multipliers may be applied for each band or for the whole contest. For instance, if you operate in the ARRL January VHF Contest and make 10 contacts (QSO's where you exchange call letters and grid square numbers for each) all on 2 meters FM in 5 grid squares your total score would be 50.

I may not operate in all these contests, but I'd be happy to try to answer your questions: telephone 630-209-4116 and/or JFSiepmann@hotmail.com.

Remember you can always casually participate in these contests or most any contest and spent a few minutes or a few hours to become familiar with the events. Actually only a minority (typically 10% to 25%) of the operators are really serious contestants and most will be happy to take a few moments to help out newbies – we all have been newbies.

BTW, the Jan. 17 ARRL VHF contest might be of interest to many of our club members – modes are "any," e.g. cw, ssb, fm, digital – any. Take a look at it.






