As a guest editor for this month's C.A.R.L. news, I have been asked to chronicle our recent participation in ARRL's 2016 National Parks on the Air (NPOTA) initiative. I will attempt to stay on track, but, be forewarned – there is more to this story than the event itself.

QST recently published my story of the twenty-year partnership of C.A.R.L. and Arizona Science Center. At the end of the article was the obligatory contact information for the author and, with that door open, I was contacted by Clark Johnson, K7LRK, of Lopez Island, WA. He was scheduled to activate Casa Grande Ruins National Monument as part of NPOTA and suspected he might need a little help. Forty third-graders had been invited to attend as part of a planned field trip to the Ruins. By Clark's own admission, he had no idea what a group of forty third-graders would be like.

The ham volunteers at Harkins Ham Shack not only know how to work with forty kids – they know how to survive a hundred kids on most days, and even more on some days. At first, I begged off, as the event was scheduled for a Wednesday, which is my standing day to work at Arizona Science Center. I offered to pass the invitation to others, but, then wheels started turning and ideas developing. I could do this. The opportunity was too good to pass up. It could be an outreach activity for C.A.R.L. and Arizona Science Center, to assist Clark, ARRL, and the National Park System in the centennial celebration.

I had no problem putting together a team of "purple shirts." Jim, N7BBS, and Tom, AD7PM, would join me at the Ruins. Mike, KG7OSR, Steve, KE7OPZ, and Jerry, K2PFW, volunteered to man the W7ASC shack in support of guest operator QSOs between the Ruins and Arizona Science Center.

During the planning stages, Bob, KF5HVN – a snowbird, sheltering in Eloy – contacted me to see if he could participate as an observer. He had learned of the NPOTA event and C.A.R.L. on social media and contacted Bob KG7QJ, who then contacted me. KF5HVN became our advance-man, repeater paths a week before the event. On activation day, he provided a display of amateur radio study and licensing information.

But, the real story began when the kids completed their tour

of the Ruins and descended upon our strange environment, set up in the outdoor-kitchen, just off the Ruins' parking lot.

After a brief history lesson on Morse code, the kids spread out at three tables where they each completed an activity we call "I sent my name in Morse code." Properly "certified" and "stickered" as fledging telegraphers — with a Morse code homework assignment in their hands — they gathered at the HF and VHF/UHF stations to earn their commemorative Guest Operator Certificates. By noon, we issued 20 Guest Operator Certificates for HF and 37 for VHF/UHF. Following their onair experiences, they visited the information tables, picking up ARRL and Arizona Science Center brochures, learning about the DIY side of amateur radio, watching a slide show of notable ham biographies, and returning frequently to the code keys and live radio activities.

By this time, Clark could no longer say he did not know what forty kids in a group would be like. Pure energy and a thirst for learning by doing.

At midday, the kids moved to another ramada for lunch and the NPOTA team paused to reflect on the day's activities. Lots of questions had been asked and answered. Visiting hams had shared their stories and seeds had been planted for followup activities within their circles of fellow hams.

As the bands had not been very productive for us earlier, it was also time to return to the airwaves to get the additional contacts needed for activation. Clark began calling CQ on his KX3, running 10 watts to a dual-band dipole, up about 20 feet at the center. After a couple of welcomed contacts, we began to hear that our NPOTA activity was showing up on spotting sites. Suddenly, we were on the receiving end of a pileup. With Clark at the microphone and two additional sets of ears straining to pull call signs from incoming signals, we worked 56 QSOs -22 states, 3 Canadian provinces - in about an hour. Activation accomplished!

The success of this event was due to the dedication, interest, and ability to cooperate exhibited by amateur radio operators. Alone, each of us is just an amateur radio operator. Together, we are a living communication network that survives, literally, by word-of-mouth. On this particular day, 8 hams, 2 XYLs, and 1 Park Ranger came together in the Arizona dessert to pass the spirit of amateur radio to 40 kids – most of who had only recently heard of amateur radio – from their teachers, as preparation for their field trip.

So... How close are you to America's next amateur radio operator? Sixty miles down the road... Or, next door?

Get on the radio, recall what it has meant to you, and pass it on! W7ASC is open for connections.

In Maricopa, our ham club meetings are not always about ham radio. Our February meeting was our second annual Bullets and Brats event. No, we didn't take the kids out to the range for target practice. It's more about doing a barbecue along with some informal target shooting. Jerry, K0FC, is the event's organizer.



Arizona Near Space Research (ANSR) will be launching and tracking two balloons from Maricopa for the Arizona Space Grant Consortium's ASCEND program, on April 2nd. Ten different colleges/universities in the state have students building experiments that will fly on these balloons. If you are interested in joining us, please contact an ANSR member. A successful launch was observed by many at the Yuma Hamfest on Saturday, February 20th. The balloon ascended to over 99,000 feet with observers on the ground able to see live video from two different cameras and watch tracking of the balloon on www.aprs.fi. Unfortunately, as the balloon burst, fragments of the balloon wrapped around the parachute and it was unable to slow the descent. The payloads crashed into the Yuma Proving Grounds at approximately 44 miles per hour. Because of restrictions with entering the Yuma Proving Grounds, the recovery had to be delayed until Tuesday morning. Everything was found to be intact, but some payloads were damaged. the new stuff costing hundreds/thousands of dollars per radio. They are also repairable by our tech committee. Most of the newer radios have become "factory service" only or simply disposable. We will probably stay with the old ANALOG MICORS for the foreseeable future, but we are considering available replacement models that are a little newer, but still serviceable. Considering we have around 70 radios in service, their track record has been excellent."

The ARA's primary mission is to provide repeaters for disaster and emergency use. These need to be systems that the greatest number of hams can access. For now, the Baofeng repeaters are not cut out for the task. Maybe next year.

The Yuma hamfest is a topnotch event. Put it on your list for 2017!




