

Arizona Near Space Research is working on plans for our next launch at the Hamfest in Williams, a new trailer for hauling and storing supplies, and plans to fly a crossband repeater from Ft. Sumner on the HASP flight in early September. (For more information, see

http://sites.wff.nasa.gov/code820/news/news_article37.html).

At the ground station in Williams, live video feed from the flight and tracking of the flight will be available. Two crossband repeaters will be flown, testing for future flights. One will have an input frequency of 146.56 using CTCSS tones 162.2 and output frequency 445.925 and the second will Input frequency of 147.56 using CTCSS tones 89.1 and output frequency of 446.025. We will be testing different antenna systems and are looking for volunteers - anyone wanting to help test, when at altitude. In the past, hams from Las Vegas and El Paso have connected to the repeater. Flight launch will be 9 a.m. MST July 23rd and the repeaters should be at altitude from about 9:30 a.m. to about 11 a.m.

Thank you (ma halo) to Fred, NA2U, for his aloha presentation at the June meeting about operating from Volcano (the town) on the Big Island of Hawaii. It was good to learn more about the Hawaiian Islands and to see the amazing station that Max, KH6ZM, has assembled. Fred has certainly done well in both DX contests and the non-contest pileups every time he has visited Max's station.

As predicted in the last newsletter, 6 meters has had some exciting sporadic E openings over the past month. The ARRL June VHF contest yielded plenty of North American grid squares and a few stations outside of the USA and Canada. However, the real fireworks came the day after the contest on Monday, June 13th. The best summary was in an email on the CADXA Yahoo Group from Ned, AA7A, excerpted here:

It seems like there are one or two days a year when we get an opening to EU on 6m multi-hop, sporadic E. Today might have been that day. It started for me at 1503Z when I heard F6FRR start to burble up out of the noise. The DX maps that present the paths for 6m openings were looking very promising, but there were no reported contacts out to the west up to that time.

The band stayed open for the next three hours, which is the longest EU opening I have ever seen out here. I managed to log 19 EU stations over that time in 10 DXCC entities (F, EA6, GM, GD, G, ON, PA, CT, EI and DL). My local skimmer picked up a few more callsigns in a few other DXCC that I never got around to working. Also heard, but not worked here, was EA and EA8.

One thing that was quite unusual in this opening was the fact that while hearing the EU stations, I was not hearing any stations in between. The band was clearly open to the Midwest since I was hearing many of the usual beacons in W0 but there were literally no stations copied in the band from 50080 to 50110 other than EU stations. Apparently, we had what is called a chordal hop in our path where there is a reflection in another Es layer where signals never reach the ground. Either that or everyone in the Midwest has antenna patterns with 100 dB front-to-back. I cannot remember ever hearing anything like this before.

Speaking of 6 meters, two of our club members will be QRV from Jamaica on VHF between June 23 and July 5. Watch for Larry, WO7R, operating as 6Y7R and Ned, AA7A, operating as 6Y5AZ. They will be active on 6m and 2m EME (moonbounce) as well as the HF bands.

The July CADXA meeting (on July 7th at 7:00 p.m.) will feature the 3XY1T video from the Italian DXpedition Team led by Silvano, I2YSB. His team has conducted many successful DXpeditions over the years and this one was responsible for over 90,000 QSOs earlier in 2016. Come join us in the cool confines of the PERA Club. There will be leftover BBQ chocolate cake from KY7M's freezer included in the meeting refreshments.

2-Meter Repeater Update – A commercial grade antenna was located by K8BN and W7USA. It will soon be installed for the CADXA 2-meter repeater, K5VT/R, on 147.32 (+) (no PL tone). Once the antenna work is completed, we are planning to have a weekly net at 0200Z (7:00 p.m. local time) on the Thursday nights when there is no club meeting. Stay tuned for more information.

W7ASC -Not your Granddad's Ham Shack!

The Center for Amateur Radio Learning (C.A.R.L.) has operated a demonstration Ham radio station for more than 20 years, in a variety of Phoenix locations. It started with a different Call Sign, but C.A.R.L. was able to obtain the current Vanity call after the station moved into the Arizona Science Center, the current location. Some of the founders can still be heard on the air from W7ASC when they volunteer. The station is operated by volunteers, of course. The plan is to operate during all hours that the Science Center is open, but the staffing scheduler has no authority to draft operators. There are some times when the station is dark. Many of you who are reading this newsletter have had a QSO with W7ASC, but not many have actually visited the third floor (initially the second floor) of the Science Center. Tucked away in one corner of the My Digital World gallery, under a metal canopy that reads "Harkins Ham Shack," there it is. Were it not for the sign, you might not realize that it is, indeed, a working Ham station. At that modest spot, many visitors have had their first experience with Morse code. And, for that matter, with Ham radio! But that is why W7ASC is there.

The Station has two complete and independent operating positions, although the equipment changes from time to time as volunteers bring some of their own gear into the shack, there is usually a decent HF rig, a VHF/UHF rig, a computer on each side and a Morse code key embedded in each operating table. The software is Ham and communication related. Echo Link? Of course. PSK31 is there. At least one rig is controlled by Ham Radio Deluxe. The antenna farm, on the roof, is reasonable and probably better than the average Ham can install. On one side there includes a complete Ham TV installation.

The Station, however, does not exist for the entertainment of the Volunteers. Now we come to the inside information, so pay attention. Operating priority is with the visitor. For some volunteers, this is a difficult change from the home station. Picture this: you are a volunteer, sitting at one of the positions. It is early and the Gallery is devoid of visitors. The bands are hopping! This is your chance to snag some rare DX. And there it is. There are only two legal stations in Lower Slovakia, and one of them is just starting to return your call!! A Mother walks

up and starts to tell her second grader how this is a CB station and Morse was invented, during WW II, as a secret way to communicate.

So, Volunteer, what do you do? Send that pair away so that you can brag about your DX catch? Sadly, but knowing your duty, you ignore that rare Lower Slovakian station and turn to the visitors. You start to help them, correcting the misinformation. Both Mom and son learn the real story about Morse. They do their names in code, receiving a Certificate and that special sticker. You have their attention, so you put them on one of the repeaters for a short QSO with Sierra Vista. (Forget the fact that Manchuria is pouring in on Ten). That never happened in your granddad's Shack, did it?

Some visitors are so intrigued by this simple demonstration that they want more. You, the

Volunteer on duty, show them many of the other operating options that you know how to invoke. It often happens that other visitors, seeing some action, draw near and soon you have a crowd. Your fellow Volunteer is surrounded by children and adults who are busy with the code key. Questions fly. You hope that you are providing accurate and interesting responses. You look up. The day has flown by and it is time to QRT. Just as you start to pack up the station, a few young visitors, having heard about Morse code, want a turn at the key. So you drag your feet about the close down, giving a few more visitors a thrill that they never expected to experience. Then you are home, answering questions about why you were late! You reflect on the day and think about all of those visitors who now know that W7ASC is NOT CB and that Ham radio is a public service. Some of those visitors will be clutching the flier that tells them about the upcoming Technician license classes. Others will have selected one or more of the handouts. You will know that some of those visitors will be back, with more questions, including the one about how they can join in the fun. With their own license. There is a great feeling to be experienced when a visitor dashes off, returning with a friend or a family member, urging them to do the code. Now you know why you volunteer. Why it is so addictive. The inside story of W7ASC. Or, at least, some of it.

You, too, can get in on the fun at W7ASC. Call Bob KG7QJ at 480-961-1109. He will send you the simple application. Once you have been accepted by Arizona Science Center, Bob will find some time that fits your schedule. There is no hard and fast rule about volunteering. Make it convenient on yourself. Give it a try. You will probably find it to be very different from any other Ham experience.
