Hello and greetings from the Arizona Red Cross Communications Club (ARCCC). We're excited to be joining the ADAW family and hope you will follow us as we help serve the emergency communications needs of the Arizona Red Cross. We're pleased to be able to partner with our sister club, the Arizona Amateur Radio Club, who also uses the Red Cross facilities for their activities.

Last month, we installed our repeater at the Red Cross building. It's on 146.84 (minus) with a PL of 162.2. This will be a temporary location until we can find a better home for it. Our current location (Biltmore area of Phoenix) restricts propagation to the North and East so our footprint is mainly Northwest through Southeast. The plan is to use the repeater for our drills and exercises, but it is open to the general public otherwise.

We are also in the process of setting up our Echolink connection thru the K7ARC repeater (K7ARC-R). We will then be able to link Red Cross chapters throughout the state.

As with anything technology based, there is bound to be a few hiccups along the way, so be patient as we work those issues out.



Like many other clubs planning to activate their local National Parks, OVARC plans to activate HP45 at The Tumacacori National Historic Park in the Santa Cruz River Valley just south of Tubac, AZ. In order to beat the heat, we plan to be on the air about 6:00 A.M. and depart about the time the park festivities begin at 10:00 A.M.. Upgrades to the OVARC repeater system are continuing. We have replaced a number of aging components.

MARANA IS RADIOACTIVE . . . On August 27th, the Repeater Committee convened to the Marana Town Center to install another O.V.A.R.C. Repeater. The installation was directed by the Repeater Committee's chairman, Gary Schmitz, KT7AZ. Using an outside third party to climb the tower, the first part of the installation was to elevate and mount a Telewave vertical antenna. With a gain of 7dB, the design is particularly tolerant of lightening strikes, making it ideal for tower mounting. Tightening the bolts on the tower, at an elevation of 90 feet, the LMR600 cable was routed inside the tower down to ground level. About 30 minutes later, the repeater was on the air and testing began. After a few level adjustments, the repeater was fully commissioned for use. A coverage map is now being generated, but the repeater is expected to have solid coverage from Rio Rico to Casa Grande. This brings the total population of O.V.A.R.C. repeaters to 7, which includes 2 meters, 70 centimeters and D-Star. Congratulations to the O.V.A.R.C. Repeater Committee for a job well done!

The OVARC Hamfest is November 12th, so mark your calendar and make plans to come down. We'll be at the same location as last year. We are on the hunt for donations from SK's, estate sales, or anyone else that has a saleable amateur radio-related item. Beginning DX - Part I

Interested in working DX – distant stations? Here's how to get started.

For a station, you don't need much – a basic one hundred watt HF rig and simple wire antennas. Just make sure the antennas are efficient. Easiest? Put up a 20-meter dipole. If it has good SWR, it is probably a good enough performer to start with. Just get it up as high as you can – at least 20 feet. If you can't manage that, try 15 or 17 meter dipoles. For licensing, you only need a General class license. So, get your General or maybe even your Extra.

How do you actually do it? Many DX stations have limited English. So, they often prefer contests or just sitting on a frequency working as many stations as fast as they can. For the basic countries like France or Wales (yes, it counts separately), they are easy to work. Big secret: nobody cares if you actually turn in a contest log. This happens all the time. Just learn the proper contest "exchange" and go for it. This is by far the easiest way to run up a big score. Eventually, you will care about whether it is France, Guadeloupe, or something else. To get started, just work everything you can.

If you contact stations in contests, especially on bands like 15 and 20 meters (you can put up a "fan" dipole and work both bands from one antenna), you will start to learn about propagation. Basically, you'll hear Europe and Africa in the morning, South America and the Caribbean throughout the day, and Asia and the Pacific just before sunset and (on 20 meters) into the evening.

Soon, you'll hear what we DXers call a pileup. As a beginner, you will want to avoid those. There's a lot of DX to be worked that is easy to do and on the same frequency you listen on. Just like a stateside HF net really. But you'll soon realize that many stations that "should be" easy to work keep saying "up five" and don't respond to you. What's that all about?

When a DX station has many hams calling him or her, their strategy is to transmit on one frequency and then listen "up" – that is, to a different, higher frequency. Almost all HF rigs have two VFOs and can be put into a "split" mode that transmits on one frequency and listens on another. The DX will transmit on the lower frequency and you have to guess how far up (higher in frequency) the DX is listening. If you can figure that out and transmit there, your chances of being the next station the DX selects is high. If you guess wrong, someone else will win. If

you listen well enough, you may discover a pattern that enables a very shrewd guess as to where the DX will listen next.

Now, some really rare DX stations have howling pileups. Just avoid those. Look for one like Figure One.




Figure 1 – Small Pileup

Here we see a "medium rare" DX station sitting on 30 meters, around 10116.8. Higher up the band at 10.118 is at least one station who thinks the DX is listening there. This is a CW snapshot, but the same idea applies to SSB or RTTY. You, the "chaser," set your listening VFO on 10116.8 and try to put your transmit VFO on the "right" frequency (maybe 10118.2?) and be the next to make contact. But even with a small pileup, you may find it prudent to give up. When to know? When it stops being fun.

Once you have more experience, you can begin to deal with howling pileups like this one:




Figure 2 – Large Pileup

Beginners don't enjoy these kind of pileups. Just tune the dial to something more manageable and focus on fun.

That's it. You can have a lot of fun just working gardenvariety DX until you have enough experience to go after the rarer stuff. And the CADXA will Elmer you so you can take on the tougher pileups when you are ready.

BEHIND THE SCENES AT W7ASC

Every shift at the Harkins Ham Shack brings a new experience. Each visitor enters the station with a unique set of expectations. The Volunteer on duty must be attuned to the visitor's attitude and find a way to move the demonstration along lines that create an impression that resonates with that visitor's world view. No one has suggested that this is an easy task.

Some visitors are quite young. They would like to push buttons with no real concern for cause and effect. The idea of using that button for other than just the feel and click is alien to their experience up to that point. Timing, duration, and rhythm must be introduced one step at a time, or the visitor never gets the message. Of course, no two youngsters are identical. To some, the idea of dits and dahs makes instant sense. Get on with my name! To some the mystery remains behind a cloud and the Volunteer/instructor plods on, hoping that somewhere along the line the concept will break through. That is why this Volunteer never invites a visitor to try Morse. Everyone who stops in the Shack reaches some degree of success. So we suggest that they "do," not just "try" (thanks, Yoda). That is, after all, what the signs says. "Do your name in Morse code."

A family stopped at the entrance to the Shack. Typical nuclear family/Father, Mother and two young girls. The girls appeared to be about seven and four. Under the gaze of the proud parents, the older girl took up a pen and proceeded to demonstrate that she could, indeed, write her name in the boxes on the form. That task completed, she followed instructions to use the button (key) to form the dit, then the dah, and, finally, combine them to form the Morse A. A little light came on in her eye. The parents glowed with pride at what their offspring had learned in that brief moment. Now the Instructor/Volunteer filled in the code for each letter of the girl's name, and she proceeded to do it. A pause for further instruction about the need to separate the letters. Then her name could be heard, in Morse of course, across the gallery. Certificate awarded. Sticker/badge (I sent my name in Morse Code) proffered and affixed, by her, to a prominent place on her blouse. Session done? Her voice is too soft to work on the radio, so we wait for her to leave. But not so fast! She insists that her young sister must do her name. Well, we are there to serve. How will we do that? No need to worry. Big Sister becomes the instructor!

Fills out the code sheet with little sister's name. Asks the Instructor to fill in the code.

Shows little sister how to do the dit, then the dah. Guides her finger to make the Morse A. Then on to the name in Morse, guiding the little finger through it all. Hands the form over to the instructor for validation and certification. Peels off a fresh sticky badge and places it on the little sister's shirt waist. Looks up for approval! (which she did receive from all observers). So – is the mission complete?

Not really. Little sister has a stuffed animal that must learn Morse code. Big sister does the entire protocol again for that animal. Without complaint or hesitation.

The family seems reluctant to leave the Shack. What else can we do for them? We talk a bit about Ham radio and present some colorful flyers. Since they are Science Center members, we invite them to return for a refresher. As the family walks on to other activities in the area, the girls turn to show those new Morse badges to their parents. The day is off to a great start in the Harkins Ham Shack. (Hint – that Volunteer could have been YOU)

The Great Roof Repair Project may actually be complete! Not really sure, but it was to start the evening of 29 August. Unless the Cosmos has taken an unusual turn, that is a date in history. This is a project with many pieces and many performers/managers. Let us explain.

The City of Phoenix owns the building that houses the Arizona Science Center. The roof also belongs to Phoenix. It has been up there in the Arizona sun for almost eighteen years. As is typical of flat roofs in this climate, it has developed a few flaws. The City wants to repair those flaws in order to protect the integrity of the building. But Phoenix does not have roof repair technicians on its payroll. Phoenix has issued a contract for the work to a local roofing company. That company, in order to stay in business, has a backlog of roof jobs, each with its own problems and imperatives. This job apparently requires access to both the inside and the outside of the roof. Special equipment must be used inside, and some exhibits are in the wrong location for that to happen. The Arizona Science Center has a relatively small exhibit staff. Their job is to keep the exhibits in repair. This small, though experienced, staff must now move some exhibits in order to allow the roof repair contractor to get that large equipment into the correct location. One of those exhibits is a HUGE motorized preying Mantis. That does not belong to the Science Center! It must be moved very carefully. The Science Center wishes to stay in operation and not shut down.

When the Ham shack was first installed, it was on the Science Center second floor. At that time, the decision was made to place the antennas on the roof! That roof now leaks and is the subject of the repair project. Back in the last century, the W7ASC volunteer corps was 20 years younger, fearless

and nimble. The roof, the platform for the antennas, is about sixty feet off the ground. Access is ONLY via a shaky ladder that is bolted to the outside of one wall. No other options exist. The building was not designed to be an antenna farm.

There is yet another factor. A crane is required in order to move equipment and materials up to the roof. A crane that can lift heavy stuff sixty feet in the air is expensive. It will be onsite for the shortest possible amount of time. The roof will be sealed and the crane and the contractor will leave.

Somewhere in this flurry of activity the Ham shack antennas will need to come down, be replaced, and possible repaired. New cable will be pulled into place. Some of the original volunteers are now grandfathers. They have life insurance with "falling off of buildings" exclusions. Some have arthritis. The ranks of the available have thinned.

The above gives you some idea why we are unable to give you a firm schedule for Ham shack operations during this project. Volunteers will probably be there to teach Morse. EchoLink should work. There have been suggestions that we use mag mount antennas. Great idea, but the ham shack is all wood and plastic. We can reach the ARA network through the Chase tower repeater using a hand held. Count on the Volunteers to be resourceful! They are, after all, Hams!
