The official start of Field Day is at 1800 UTC Saturday (that's 11:00 a.m. for those of us here in Arizona) and ends Sunday at 2100 UTC (or 2:00 p.m. Arizona time). There are six entry categories or classes - A thru F - which are determined by who is participating, how many people are participating, and the location. Class A is club/non-club with three or more people and Class B is club/non-club with one or two people. The other classes consist of mobile, home using commercial power, home using emergency power, and EOC operations. The amount of time you can operate depends upon when you began setting up. If you are Class A or B and set up BEFORE 1800 UTC (11:00 a.m.) Saturday, you can only operate for 24 hours from the time you begin operating. If you don't start your set up until 1800 UTC (11:00 a.m.) on Saturday, you can operate the entire 27-hour period. In addition, you may not begin setting up before 0000 UTC Friday (5:00 p.m. Thursday).

Confused? Yeah, it can be a little confusing. Visit the ARRL's Field Day page at http://www.arrl.org/field-day to learn more.

The best way to experience and learn about Field Day is to attend a club Field Day event. In this way, you will learn about Field Day from other hams, and experience the comradery and fun of Field Day. To find out what your club is planning for Field Day, be sure to read their column in this month's edition. If your club is not planning an event this year, check out one of the other clubs' operations. Visitors are always welcome.

Did you make it to the Cochise Amateur Radio Club's hamfest on May 6? The event was well attended and the weather was great! As always, it was a very enjoyable hamfest in the southern part of the state.

The 2017 Prescott Hamfest is fast approaching. This is the second year for this event which will be held on June 9 & 10, 2017 at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in Prescott. This year, Friday will feature seminars from noon until 4:30 p.m. and VE testing from 4:30 to 7:30 p.m. Admission on Friday is free.

On Saturday, the hamfest will be in full swing with tailgating from 7:00 a.m. until noon, commercial vendors from 7:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m., a balloon launch at 9:00 a.m. (weather permitting), and seminars from noon until 3:00 p.m. Admission on Saturday is \$5 per person and tailgating is \$10 per space. Closing ceremonies will be held at 3:00 p.m. which will feature

If you want to get accredited, or just want to take a test, our VE sessions are on the third Wednesday of every month at 6:00 p.m. at the Honor Health Medical Office Building, 19841 N 27th Ave in Phoenix.

Dan Harkins entertained the attendees with tales of his early ham radio days, with his Dad, Red Harkins and Senator Barry Goldwater. Even though the audience included some old-time hams, Dan's tales held everyone's attention.

Community

Community. It's a word we all know – or do we? Today, community has less to do with demographics or geography, and more to do with a sense of connection and the unexpected. The amateur radio community is a prime example. It has no boundaries. Not location, economics, gender, race, nor education. Even with three levels for earned operating privileges, it is about as flat of an organized community as you will experience. Senator Barry Goldwater was known to say "Just Barry, K7UGA" when a fellow ham figured out who was on the other end of the QSO.

While it may be difficult to define, we all know when "community" is at work in our lives. Here are a few examples from our own backyard – and beyond.

While preparing Harkins Ham Shack for operation one Wednesday, I noticed the message light on the telephone. I pressed the message retrieval button and prepared to take notes; even though such messages are usually several days old and no longer timely. This message was different – brief and a bit hard to understand, but clearly a call for help. The message was from a hospitalized ham who hoped someone from our group would visit him. He had reached out to the only

community he knew that, on a daily basis, sought and initiated contacts with total strangers. With a little help from QRZ, I pieced together a profile of Ping, KD4CMW, and returned his call. I could not visit him that day, but promised to do so soon. As it worked out, I was able to visit him the next morning and learned that he had been passing through Phoenix on his way to Washington from New Mexico. He became ill at the airport and was taken to a local hospital. He had no other contacts in Phoenix, but counted on the ham community to extend a hand. In a couple of hours, we learned more about each other, talked a lot about amateur radio, and made an EchoLink contact on a smart-phone. I also learned of his personal friendship with Tom Gallagher, NY2RF, the new CEO of ARRL. When contacted, Tom did not hesitate to reach out personally to comfort his ham brother in need. Community!

With the promise of a grand tour of the Valley of the Sun upon his dismissal, I left for home, intending to return at the beginning of the next week. That visit never happened. I lost contact with Ping over the weekend and hospital regulations prevented me – not community in their eyes – from getting information on his whereabouts. From our time together earlier, I had enough family history to locate a relative in the East. She informed me her brother had passed away a few days after my visit. Because of her understanding of ham radio, she afforded me a trust that I had not otherwise earned. It was a privilege to be a bridge between siblings who had not seen each other for some time. Community!

Earlier, C.A.R.L. had published the story of the Harkins Ham Shack in the February issue of QST. As a result, Clark, K7LRK, Lopez Island, WA requested assistance with an NPOTA activation in Arizona – and subsequently with a Morse code activity for kids on Field Day 2017. Cathy, KD7PF, Orinda, CA, requested the same code activity, and other ideas for her club's open-house. Tom, WB0DHB, Duluth, MN, shared his experience as a teenager who brought his HW-101 to Arizona when he visited his cousins. One of his local QSOs was with Red Harkins, W7EAQ (SK), who was operating the MARS station at the QTH of Barry Goldwater, K7UGA (SK). Red invited the young ham, along with his aunt and cousins, to visit Barry's shack where they observed Mars in action and, coincidentally, met the senator. Community!

More recently, the ham volunteers at Arizona Science Center were honored with a luncheon celebrating National Volunteer Week and two decades of partnership between the C.A.R.L. and Arizona Science Center. The keynote speaker, Dan Harkins, W7EEO, told great stories about his father and how amateur radio played out in his early years. Red, a successful entrepreneur and media pioneer, took his commitment to serve his community through amateur radio seriously. Dan recounted how his father was late for the grand opening of a new theatre in the family business because it was

The Maricopa Amateur Radio Association is planning for Field Day. This is probably the most popular national ham radio event in North America. Just listen to the ham bands in any mode, CW, phone, or digital, and you will hear more stations calling CQ in an hour than you'll hear during the whole day any other time of the year – contests included. Field Day is always the fourth full weekend of June, beginning at 1800 UTC Saturday and running through 2059 UTC Sunday.

The first Field Day was 84 years ago, in 1933. History buffs know that was the year both Adolf Hitler and Franklin D. Roosevelt came to leadership in their respective countries. The United States was in the midst of the Great Depression and the Blaine Act was passed ending prohibition in the United States. Bonnie and Clyde were terrorizing the countryside. With all that happening, amateur radio operators still found a way to disconnect their radios from the power grid, sparse as it was in those times, and operate off of noncommercial power.

One of the things that make Field Day popular is club events. This gives hams who may not always have the opportunity to work the HF bands to dig in and make contacts. Don't have off-the-grid capability with your HF station at home? Find a Field Day activity somewhere and get involved.

Field Day involves more than just operating. There's usually some level of camping out, cooking out, and always socializing with other hams. There is the learning opportunity too. Find out what it takes to string up a portable antenna or charge a battery using solar power. The primary purpose of this event is to help develop skills for operating under less-than-optimum conditions.

One of the more fun things to do in Field Day operating is to try for a "clean sweep." That means working each ARRL section in all 50 states and the Canadian Provinces. It's really not that difficult if you're persistent and have the endurance to operate overnight.

You're really missing out on a lot of fun, not to mention a decades-old tradition, if you don't participate in Field Day. Now, let me make it even easier for you to operate during Field Day this year. If you don't belong to a club that's holding their own Field Day event, you're welcome to attend ours. The details are in a flyer attached to this newsletter, or available on our club forum at http://w6sdm.net/Forum/ showthread.php?tid=8419. We welcome everyone, licensed or not. Everyone who wants to will get a chance to operate. We've taken care of the radios, the antennas, the solar panels, the batteries, and the generators.



Much to the relief of the DX community, the ARRL retracted its recent deletions of KH4, Midway Island, and KH7K, Kure Island, from the active list of DXCC entities. Those deletions caused a major "disturbance in The [DX] Force," especially for those DXers who had recently qualified for Honor Roll status or who had recently achieved a new milestone in the DX Challenge standings. What DXers found most disturbing about the deletions was that they were ordered by ARRL Headquarters without any consultation with the DX Advisory Committee (DXAC). This was a big topic of conversation at the 2017 International DX Convention in Visalia, California in April.

We had over 70 people attend the May Barbecue Meeting. Thankfully, the PERA Club allowed us to move this annual event indoors once we saw the forecast high temperature of 104 degrees. Last year we survived gale force winds and moved indoors for the presentation after eating windblown BBQ food in the ramada. This year, we did it all indoors rather than risking heat stroke and dehydration. The program by Ned, AA7A on his life in ham radio moon bounce was very well received. He took us through the fascinating journey of moon bounce technology from its birth as a concept in World War 2 up to the present day in Maricopa, AZ where he and others are constructing what will be one of the largest moon bounce antennas in the world at a site owned by Larry, WO7R.

Radio conditions for DXing continue to be challenging during the bottom of the sunspot cycle. This time of year the only bands showing any promise for working DX are from 17 meters to 40 meters and many days even those bands are limited to domestic propagation only. We are in the Sporadic E season, however, and that means 6 meters may provide some surprises with multiple-hop signals reaching beyond our borders. It is a good time to keep the N3TUQ "6 Meter DX Map" open on a computer screen to watch for openings. https://n3tuq.com/dxmap.php

The CADXA was integrally involved in supporting the International DX Convention in Visalia in April run this year by the Northern California DX Club. CADXA members organized all seminar speakers (AA7A and KY7M), did Banquet seating for 600 attendees (WO7R), and ran the raffle Prize Room (XYLs of KY7M and AA7A with help from K7MY and XYL of WO7R). More than 700 hams and guests attended, including about 40 from outside the USA. The

Update: SB1132 - Amateur Radio License Plates

The Arizona Legislature FINALLY adjourned sine die on Wednesday, May 10th, at 7pm. This is 3 weeks later than normally scheduled. SB1132 will become law on August 9th, 90 days after the session was adjourned.

As with many steps in the process, it's a hurry up and wait situation. Work has already begun on PRB-1 and HOA legislation in Arizona for next session. Also, pre-empting or defending distracted driving bans on ham radio as seen in Pima county.

The next meeting of the Amateur Radio Council of Arizona is at the Prescott Hamfest on June 10th. SB1132 will be on the agenda. Any status updates and future planning will be discussed at that time.
