SKYWARN Recognition Day 2018 is Saturday, December 1 UTC

SKYWARNTM Recognition Day (SRD) 2018 takes place on Saturday, December 1, from 0000 until 2400 UTC. Developed in 1999 by the National Weather Service (NWS) and ARRL, SRD celebrates the contributions that SKYWARN volunteers make to the NWS mission, the protection of life and property. During SKYWARNTM Recognition Day, special event stations will be on the air from NWS offices, contacting radio amateurs around the world.

"Amateur Radio operators comprise a large percentage of the SKYWARNTM volunteers across the country," the NWS announcement said. "Amateur Radio operators also provide vital communication between the NWS and emergency management, if normal communications become inoperative."



The object of SRD is for all amateur stations to exchange contact information with as many National Weather Service stations as possible on 80, 40, 20, 15, 10, 6, and 2 meters, plus 70 centimeters. Contacts via repeaters are permitted. Stations should exchange call sign, signal report, and location plus a quick description of the weather at your location (e.g., sunny, partly cloudy, windy, rainy, etc.). EchoLink and IRLP nodes, including the Voice over Internet Protocol Weather Net (VoIP-WX), are expected to be active as well.

Stations will employ various modes, including SSB, FM, AM, RTTY, CW, and PSK31. While working digital modes, special event stations will append "NWS" to their call signs (e.g., N0A/NWS). It's suggested that during SRD operations a non-NWS volunteer serve as a station control operator.

Event certificates are electronic and printable from the main website at the conclusion of SRD. Submit SRD log summaries using the online submission form.





AMATEUR RADIO SERVICE DEMONSTRATION STATION

As this is the last Newsletter in 2018, we take the time to reflect on the events of the year at W7ASC. This has been a good year at the station. Field Day was, as usual, well attended. Extra volunteers manned the Morse code demonstration positions, awarding certificates and "I Sent My Name in Morse code" badges.

Throughout the year, many visiting children announce that they have been taught Morse code in school! That is, of course, a good thing to hear. But what inspired the teachers to add this detail to the curriculum? Could it be those comprehensive Teacher Packets that are handed out to visiting teachers who come by the Station? John K7JP, who "invented" those packets, is, himself a retired teacher, so he has a good feeling for material that works in the classroom. These packets contain materials about Ham radio. When those children enter the station, usually as part of a school field trip, the volunteer on duty does not need to start with the basics. Those children are usually eager to actually hear Morse code. They have only seen the dots and dashes on paper. The transition to using the Key is quick and easy.

Those of you have never visited the Station ("The Shack") at the Arizona Science Center are probably unaware that there is a log book in which visiting Hams are asked to register. This log includes an impressive record. As one looks through the Log, the range of visitors will certainly impress. It is almost possible to reach a WAS award, and certainly a Century mark. It is almost as if there is a big, illuminated CQ sign hanging over the Shack entrance. Like to meet Hams? Hams from other countries and other regions? Sign up to volunteer at W7ASC. In addition, many visitors do not speak English! The Arizona Science Center attracts visiting students and tour groups. If you speak another language, you might get a chance to use it face-to-face, as well as on the air.

All of us who hold a license are generally aware that there is no statutory age limit to Ham radio. In fact, one could argue that it is inherently tilted toward the young as new technology intrudes into the Ham environment. It is still, however, a surprise when a real person keys up and responds to your CQ. Still more surprising is when a really small person visits the Shack and displays a license! This happens more frequently than you might guess. W7ASC has, in its history, had two Volunteers who were 10 years of age. One, a young lady, is

now attending college. No surprise – she is on her way to an engineering degree.

You might hear our youngest Volunteer on the air. He started when he was 10. Time marches on, so now he is a mature 11. Gavin does a great job, either with visitors, in person, or on the air.

Many of the W7ASC volunteers carry a Medicare card. This gives visitors the impression that Ham radio is only for senior citizens. The truth is that the hours of operation tend to favor older persons, simply as a result of work or school schedules. If you are younger, or know younger Hams, the Ham shack schedule can be tweaked to make allowances for odd hours of availability. You, or your young acquaintances, would be welcome to join in the fun at the Station. Call the direct number, or visit the web site, for more information.

Volunteers do more than just teach visiting cherubs to do Morse code! The Station is in a constant state of flux. Equipment fails and must be repaired or repaired. New Ham software becomes available. The Station should be demonstrating the very latest technology, if possible. The Volunteer group is very democratic. Yes – there are officers and a Board of Directors, but each volunteer has a voice in the operation of C.A.R.L. which is the formal organization to which the Volunteers belong. But every volunteer is equal and every voice is heard. Consider adding your voice, and your skills/experience/interests. W7ASC GOES WHERE THE VOLUNTEERS TAKE IT!



This fall saw several changes to the repeaters operated by the Old Pueblo Radio Club. Our 147.30MHz repeater had to be removed as its owner has moved out of state.

Our oldest repeater, 146.82 MHz, also has been permanently decommissioned. For many years, television station KVOA has hosted its equipment and antenna. The tower on which the antenna was mounted was originally used by KVOA radio, one of the early stations to go on the air in Tucson, and was at least seventy years old. For safety reasons, it was dismantled. Our repeater antenna was its last occupant. We thank KVOA for its many years of permitting us to occupy the tower, and we thank its staff for keeping an eye on it for us. OPRC continues to be represented on the two-meter band on the southeast part of town with its 146.66 MHz repeater.

Our 12 December meeting will be our last meeting of the year, and will be our annual general meeting at which any necessary club business may be addressed.
