October finished our third Copafest. Each year it gets a little better – probably because every year we learn more about what it takes to put an activity like this together. This year, our profit was better than the previous two years. We didn't have any major kinks. Most everything went according to plan.

There are around 18 hamfests in the state of Arizona each year. Clubs use hamfests as fundraisers. For many, it's the only significant money coming into the club to finance expenses and activities. Keep that in mind for a moment.

Hamfests also provide a social gathering for radio amateurs. For special areas of amateur radio, like satellite and high altitude ballooning, it provides a way of demonstrating these activities in a way that can only be done in person. AMSAT and ANSR are at many of our hamfests demonstrating their activities.

The swap meet at hamfests is a fantastic way of shopping for parts, components, radios, boat anchors, and just about anything else ham radio related. We don't have Radio Shack any longer, and electronics stores are few and far between. If it weren't for hamfest swap meets, the only way of acquiring things for the shack would be shopping online.

Hamfests aren't free. Some clubs, like ours, have to pay for the venue. There are expenses up front for door prizes and raffle prizes. A big part of the club treasury can be put on the line in anticipation of a bigger return from the hamfest proceeds. They key word here is anticipation – there is no guarantee of a breakeven, not to mention a profit.

Finally, a lot of work goes into the planning and implementation of a hamfest. Many volunteer hours are put into making phone calls, attending meetings, sending e-mails, shopping for prizes and supplies, working with the local authorities and with the venue.

Now, back to the fundraising aspect of a hamfest. Admission is charged as a way of paying the club back for their effort and expense of putting on the activity. The admission is usually called a "donation" because many clubs are nonprofit corporations, which makes a donation tax deductible to the donor. Somehow, the misinterpretation that calling the admission a donation makes it optional. I was surprised at the number of people coming through the gate that didn't pay the admission for this reason.

Look, if someone can't afford the admission fee, they will be admitted anyway, without question. However, most people coming to the hamfest do so to buy something from the tailgaters or vendors at the swap meet. So, it's not like they're indigent. It's disturbing to see someone walk away from the hamfest with an arm full of things that they bought after they opted out of paying the admission. Just sayin'.

Our clubs depend on the support of their members and the support of the amateur radio community in general. Next time you're at a hamfest, take a minute to appreciate what all it took to put it together.

Look, the weather report said there would be no wind, okay? Gila Bend was supposed to be as calm as a sleeping baby. Wrong! Sporadic 20 MPH wind gusts, combined with two full 3000-gram balloons, made for one interesting launch of ANSR flights 112 and 113 on the morning of Saturday, November 18, 2017.

I'm not sure if anyone invited Murphy along for this flight, but he showed up just the same. Since a big part of our pre-flight predictions depend on local weather, especially ground winds, the accuracy of our estimated recovery area was way off. Fortunately, there was very little cloud cover and we were able to visually track the balloons from both the launch and pre deployment recovery areas – most of the time.

Flight 112 was supposed to come down somewhere near Randolph, AZ. If you've never been to Randolph, well ... I have. I was sitting in my vehicle listening to the radio traffic when I spotted the balloon, still ascending, almost directly overhead. That means it wasn't coming down anywhere near where we had predicted. Our APRS beacons allowed us to follow the flight on re-entry to about 3,000 feet – bringing us dead center into the middle of nowhere. The actual location was about 20 miles west of Dudleyville and a few miles west of Barkerville road.

We did manage to get an eclectic fleet of vehicles, including student transport vans, pickup trucks, small economy sedans, Jeeps, and a Range Rover close to where the touchdown point would be. It took some creative four-wheeling to get to the actual spot a few miles into the desert, which seemed like an endless sea of Cholla cactus. Some of our crew got a first-hand lesson in why it's called the "jumping cactus."

As an avid off-roader, I try not to leave anything behind on the trail when I go off-road. However, the trail to the recovery site was rough enough that we did leave behind a couple of rearview mirrors and a "chase vehicle" magnetic sign. My guess. Based on the amount of traffic in the area, they will be there for the next thousand years or so.

While the APRS beacon gave us a general location of where to look for the payload, it was the gleaming of the foil on one of the payload experiments that lead us to the exact site. If Tiny Tim had been there, he would have been singing "Tiptoe Through the Cholla." A half-dozen or so students were brave enough to accompany us on the recovery of flight 112.

Flight 113 was nowhere near as dramatic. Because of the

wind gusts, we weren't able to put as much helium as we had planned for, the flight was far short of the distance that was predicted. It landed on someone's property near Interstate 8 and Interstate 10. We had to contact the local police so that they could contact the property owner. We don't trespass even when nobody's looking. It took an hour or so to make contact with the owner, who graciously allowed us to recover the payload.

It was a great way to spend Saturday. Many of us got to see parts of Arizona that we had never seen before, and probably never would have otherwise. There were students from Arizona State University, Embry Riddle Aeronautical University, Central Arizona College, Pima College, Glendale Community College, East Mesa Community College, and the University of Arizona. Many of the students developed an interest in amateur radio just through their exposure to the high altitude balloon programs. Many have become licensed hams.

Our next flight will be from the Yuma Hamfest, which is also the ARRL Southwestern Division Convention on February 16-17, 2018. Last year we got rained out and were unable to fly – so this year we've been guaranteed great weather. See you there.

On behalf of the Volunteers of the ARCCC and the Red Cross, we hope you have a Happy Holiday and a joyous New Year.

Our new antenna is up and, so far, all reports are positive. We replaced a lower gain antenna with a much higher one. Along with the new 9913 coax and this upgraded antenna, we should see a vast increase in coverage as well as cleaner signals. Remember, this is an open repeater, so if you are looking for one just NE of downtown, please check it out.

Sadly, our UHF repeater is still down due to audio issues. We will be bringing that back on-line soon with a new controller card that has better audio. We will also upgrade the coax and add a new antenna.

With this new computer system, we expect to be able to run our Echolink node 24/7. Previously, we had it running on weekends and during nets. This will allow us to stay in (Ham) contact with other Red Cross Chapters, as well as making new friends during casual contacts.


