The Amateur Radio Public Service demonstration station

The Pompeii exhibit at the Arizona Science Center continues to draw large crowds to the Center. Some of these visitors find their way to the W7ASC Ham Shack. The Volunteers on duty have been very busy. If any reader had been thinking about volunteering, this would be a great time to turn thought into action. While the Station is "normally" staffed by two volunteers, this added activity has kept three volunteers very busy. The Morse code keys are rarely silent. The radios are staying unusually warm. At almost any time, there are groups of visitors clustered around the station. When added to the school busloads of enthusiastic youngsters, and the usual family groups, these added crowds, many first-time visitors, the activity level is really stimulating.

The visitors fall into distinct categories. There are those who never heard of Amateur (a.k.a. Ham) radio and are mildly curious. Then there are those who confuse the Station with CB! Yes, there are still such people. A substantial number of visitors express long-standing interest in Amateur radio. These people bombard the Volunteers with probing questions. "What does Ham radio cost?" "How do I get a license?" "What should I buy, and when should I buy it?"

A significant number of licensed Hams stop in. Few of them had any idea that the station existed. Some are even interested in volunteering!

Many are either new to Arizona, or new to Ham radio. Some of them have gear, but are not on the air. Repeaters? Clubs? Elmers? That information has not reached these people. Into that information vacuum rides ADAW! Bob, KG7QJ, sees to it that there are always copies of the latest ADAW in the Shack, ready to be handed out to these lost souls. The ADAW is a gold mine of contact information for that Ham who wants to become a part of the local Amateur radio community. Now then, here is the message:

If your club newsletter is a part of the ADAW, write it, for the next few months, with these relative Newbies in mind. Make sure that your contact information is complete and current. Do you operate one or more repeaters? Include that information. Where, and when does your club meet? We know that the West Valley runs a very popular Newbie net. W7ASC has been in continuous operation for more than 20 years. There are visitors who first visited the station as children, often as part of a school group. Now they visit the station with their own children! How cool is that?

There is a general misconception about volunteering. A volunteer can be a part of the ready reserves. Once signed up and accepted, there is no requirement to establish a fixed schedule. Sam, N7INV, keeps the Shack schedule and fits Volunteers into a slot that matched their availability. C.A.R.L/(Center for Amateur Radio Learning) would certainly wish to have all Volunteers work many hours each month, but it is not really realistic to expect that to happen! Sign up now so that you can work when it is convenient for you and your family or business schedule. Call or visit the Station for an application.

If you are not really sure what happens at the station, take the time to visit and see for yourself. Talk to some of the visitors and be prepared to be surprised by the high-level of interest in Ham radio. We hope to see you there.

ARA Linked Repeater Systems

This is a solicitation to all repeater users to provide some input about the ARA linked repeater configurations, now and future.

Over the last 50 years, as the number of ARA repeater sites and radios has grown, many radios have been linked to other radios at other sites. This provides great extended statewide, and beyond, coverage.

You can enjoy a QSO with your buds in Flagstaff, Show Low, Payson, etc. from you HT at home in Phoenix. You can check on the progress of your son driving in from out of state, and keep track of friends out hunting.

During emergencies, and when power fails, the EmComm folks can coordinate statewide from their HQ in Phoenix to insure best deployment of resources.

Currently we have two main linked systems; Metrolink, and Rimlink (which also links into Utah Intermountain Intertie).

One of the down sides of large linked systems, is one conversation can tie up many repeaters, potentially not making best use of limited resources. Sometimes even denying local coverage to those who need it.

Multiple smaller "arms" providing coverage in different directions might be a better choice. An option to link these systems to each other as needed during emergencies could be important. Maybe keeping at least one repeater on each site unlinked.

ARA is asking you, and the EmComm folks, for input on the linked system configuration, now and for the future. Give us your wish list to help guide ARA toward the best use and linking of the many radios/sites.

This past month was definitely one with "good news and bad news" for DXers. The bad news first - the long awaited DXpedition to Bouvet Island in the Antarctic, 3Y0Z, never made it to land. After two weeks of travel on some of the roughest ocean in the world, the ship was only a mile from Bouvet. However, the weather was so extremely bad that, after two days of waiting for a break in the weather, the ship's captain aborted the trip and set sail for South Africa, the closest port. This was a huge disappointment to the brave hams and crew on board the ship and to the international DX community. It is the first time in recent memory that a \$1 million DX pedition was aborted. The landing on Bouvet relied on helicopters that could not fly in the 45 knot winds and one of the ship's two engines was failing, making the captain's decision understandable with everyone's lives at stake. We wish the team and crew safe passage to ZS and back home.

The good news – a new DXCC country was born in late January 2018 after the ARRL Board amended the DXCC rules to add an additional country criteria that allowed Kosovo to be added to the country list. Long a source of debate and controversy, the international team assembled by Martti Laine, OH2BH, began operating Z60A within minutes of the announcement and the pileups of DXers began chasing this new one in earnest. The DXCC country count is back up to 340 and there is no doubt there will be enough ongoing activity from Kosovo by both the locals and visiting operators for every DXer to eventually confirm this one.

Registration for the 2018 International DX Convention (IDXC) in Visalia, California is available online at http://www.dxconvention.org/. CADXA will not be involved in the running of the convention this year. The Southern California DX Club decided to do it all themselves. After all of CADXA's efforts last year to support the Northern California DX Club, our club is actually pleased to have the year off. Many CADXA members will be there along with about 700 other DXers and a room full of vendors.

Wednesdays are a busy time at the Red Cross Phoenix Chapter. We've had an active work crew just about every week and lots of things are getting done. However, we have more projects than our regular crew members can work on. So think about joining or becoming more actives.

Did you know the Red Cross has dozens of FCC assigned frequencies for use in an emergency? We have everything from HF through UHF in non-ham allocations, and available for use during times of disaster. So not only are the Red Cross Amateur Volunteers operating on the ham bands, we're also engaged in radio communications in other parts of the spectrum.

Are you getting ADAW courtesy of the ARCCC? We're having an open house on Thursday, March 8, 2018 at 6:30 PM to showcase what's new at the chapter. The AARC folks will be our co-hosts for this event (both of us share the facility). So whether you're a member of ARCCC or AARC and haven't been active in a while, we invite you to come out and join us for an evening of chat and to visit our upgraded digs.

Our Echolink node is now up 24/7 on the VHF repeater. The Echolink software has been placed on our latest computer (station 2), and is running with an ICOM IC-228. We eventually plan on moving the Echolink node to its own dedicated CPU, so we don't tie up a general use system for Red Cross activities.

Have you tried out our net on Tuesday's at noon? The Public Service Amateur Radio Group and ARCCC have an informal net to discuss various activities within the PSARG and the Red Cross. Our HF net is on Wednesdays at 1:00 PM, mainly to check out our members' HF capabilities. Listen and perhaps join us on the K7ARC VHF repeater (146.84 – 162.2 PL) or Echolink, for both nets.

We hope you went to the Yuma Hamfest and had an opportunity to visit our Red Cross Command Van. There are only a few of these left in the National System, so we're fortunate to have one based in Arizona. We plan on it attending numerous Hamfests throughout the year.

Arizona Near Space Research is preparing for our 114th high altitude balloon flight from the Yuma Hamfest on Saturday, February 17th. We will be flying a 2,000-gram balloon that we expect to exceed 98,000 feet in altitude before it bursts. Last year, rain and overcast prevented us from flying from Yuma.

By the time you read this, we will know how close we came to our predicted landing area near Dateland, Arizona. Just to be safe, all of the chase team members have been instructed to get permits to enter the Goldwater Range.

Besides the science and learning experience of high altitude ballooning, there is the fun and excitement of the off-road experience. The Goldwater range, which borders the Organ Pipe National Monument and the Tohono O'odham Nation, is some of the most beautiful and pristine Sonoran desert landscape in Arizona – or anywhere. Because it's not generally accessible to the public, the usual damage from too much visitor traffic isn't present.

There is some trash along trails commonly used by border crossers. There is also an abundance of abandoned vehicles which were used in illegal smuggling along the border. Compared to the size of the range, there is a small impact to the overall beauty and magnificence of the area. Just about every plant and animal indigenous to the Sonoran desert is present in this area.

We will be using a variety of technology to track and locate our payload. Of course, amateur radio keeps the chase team members and ground station in contact with updated information. We use GPS, APRS, VHF radio direction finding, and human eye contact to accomplish our mission. It's a lot of fun to travel in an off-road vehicle down trails that may only see a couple of vehicles a year through the largely undisturbed desert terrain.


