#### AMATEUR RADIO SERVICE DEMONSTRATION STATION

W7ASC is a Demonstration Station for the Amateur Radio (public) Service. The Volunteers who operate the station are members of the Center for Amateur Radio Learning (C.A.R.L.), a 501(c)(3) corporation. W7ASC is open to all who visit to the Arizona Science Center (ASC) during those hours when the ASC is open. The station is located on the third floor of the Science Center in the "My Digital World" gallery. Direct phone number is 602-716-2082.

## W7ASC STILL OFF AIR

As of early October 2020, our club station had not reopened. W7ASC is physically located within the Arizona Science Center, (ASC) and is subject to rules that apply there. As of early October, when this Newsletter is being drafted, ASC was open only to limited numbers of members and then only in small groups that had to be guided through the see-only exhibits. W7ASC is primarily an interactive station, so it does not fit in the see-only category. So it remains closed, probably until the virus is generally under control.

What happens to the corps of station volunteers, members of the Center for Amateur Radio Learning (C.A.R.L.) who have kept the station operating for over 20 years? The Club officers decided that it is important to maintain the members' sense of community, so they started and have maintained a Net on a local UHF repeater (a normal Ham radio response).

The net meets Wednesdays and Saturdays at 0900 MST, on the 440.375MHz repeater located on South Mountain (owned and maintained by Ron AJ7T - thanks!). This repeater covers a large area of Phoenix and supports both analog and digital formats.

Our CARL net usually has two segments. The first is a roll call. That is followed by a discussion period, with the major topic usually suggested by the Net Control, a position that is rotated through the group of volunteers. On Saturdays, the CARL net is usually followed by a ZOOM net, hosted by Jim N7BBS. Our UHF CARL net is totally open. Visitors are always welcome!

Some day, we hope, ASC will reopen and W7ASC will return to the air and visitors will once again be introduced to Morse code and Ham radio. When that takes place, the CARL net, having served its original intended function, will probably close. We all hope that takes place in the near future, and this

## **Book Report:**

## WHAT? A book review in a Ham newsletter!

A book that should fascinate Hams is "Jackdaw" by Ken Follett. You might find it in the public library, as this scribe "read" a copy that was provided by the Phoenix Talking Book service as provided by the library.

The author, Follett, a Welshman who now lives in London, has written many well-read spy stories. This book tells a fictional tale during WW II that takes place at the time of the invasion of the continent when the Allies started to retake France from Hitler.

The Jackdaw story, while fiction, is based on actual events. Though the character names are fictional, there were real people engaged in the actions as described in his book. The Allies sent teams of spies based in England to work with the French Resistance behind the German lines. The spies were organized into teams with each given a name. This book is about a team of women and their team name was Jackdaw.

Each team included a radio operator. They carried a simple QRP radio, CW only. Transmitter and receiver were housed in a briefcase. Every team included a radio operator. The German Gestapo made serious effort to eliminate these infiltrating teams equipped to do serious damage behind German lines. Team Jackdaw was tasked to damage telephone communication that would be used to coordinate the German response to the D-day invasion.

This book details in gripping detail the interaction between the team and the members of the French Resistance. Radio communication between the team and their managers back in England is a key thread in a story where much of the key suspense involves the radio operator, Morse code, Gestapo listeners and the radio operators back in England.

Follett has written many great spy stories, but this one should really appeal to Hams. Those who are veterans of WW II will have a hard time putting this book down.

It looks as if the triple-digit days of summer are behind us at long last. We set a new record for the number of days the temperature hit 100 or more in Phoenix this year. By this time, we are usually out socializing with other hams at one of the many hamfests around the state. Not so much this year. Let's all continue to do our part to reduce the spread of COVID-19 so that we can look forward to resuming some of the activities we have all very much missed this year. Follow the advice of experts, stay vigilant, mask up and be mindful of social distancing in your daily routine.

As this is being written, yet another wildfire has caused Arizonans to evacuate their homes. The Horse fire is threatening Crown King and residents have had been told to head for safety. The Red Cross opened an evacuation center in Mayer for those displaced by the fire. We hope their evacuation will be a short one and that they will be able to return to their homes in short order.

Earlier in the week, the Arizona Red Cross Communications Club participated in the Great Shake Out, an annual earthquake preparedness event. Ironically, the Shake Out took place two days after Flagstaff felt the effects of a magnitude 3.3 temblor. We should always be prepared when disaster strikes. Most of us are well aware of the potential for wildfires or flooding across our state but we don't typically think of an earthquake when we consider disasters that affect Arizona.

The Red Cross urges all Americans to be prepared for disasters, natural or man-made. You should develop a plan for you and your family. Should you ever need to evacuate, each family member knows what they need to do to stay safe. As you develop your plan, you should also build a kit. Your disaster supplies kit is an important part of any disaster strategy and should be tailored to your family's needs. You can find out more about how to assemble a disaster supplies kit by visiting the American Red Cross website.

In November, Red Cross and ARES operators across the country will take part in a WinLink exercise that will test our ability to send email messages over the radio. This important skill enables amateur radio operators to fill the void when internet and phone service is disrupted. A recent incident near Heber caused the loss of all phone and internet service, including service to the 9-1-1 dispatch center. Local hams from Forest Lakes and Heber all the way to Flagstaff stepped up to

At the October 8 on-the-air AARC club meeting, I asked, "Do you know who the president of the ARRL is? Or for that matter, did you know that the ARRL has a president?" The president of the ARRL is Rick Roderick, K5UR, and a look at the ARRL letter of February 13, 2020 states that at the January 17-18 meeting in Windsor, Connecticut, the ARRL Board of Directors re-elected ARRL President Rick Roderick, K5UR, to a two-year term.



Rick lives north of Little Rock, Arkansas on a 50-acre hilltop QTH. He's been a ham for 52 years and is a Life Member of the ARRL. Rick has held numerous ARRL volunteer positions continuously for all of those 52 years. He has been on the ARRL Board of Directors for 29 years and currently serves as

President. He has served on all standing committees of the ARRL Board of Directors and served on numerous other committees and task forces of the Board over the years. He also served on the DX Advisory Committee and was chairman for many years. He was instrumental in the creation and implementation of Logbook of the World and the DXCC Challenge Award.

Rick has held numerous HF and VHF/UHF operating and achievement awards. Rick is an avid DXer with 371 countries worked, including 327 countries on 160 meters, 353 countries on 80 meters, 354 countries on 40 meters, some of the top standings in the world. He holds DXCC on 10 bands and is ranked 7th in the world on the DXCC Challenge Award. He holds more than 10 different Worked All Zones Awards, and was one of the first to achieve Worked All Zones on 160 meters. On VHF/UHF, he's held many operating and achievement records, including the world distance record for QSO's on 2 meters meteor scatter and 222 MHz tropo. He was one of the first to work all continental 48 states on 2 meters without the use of moon bounce, 47 states in one year. He is second in the world on 6 meters VUCC and first in the world on VUCC for 2 meters, 222 MHz, 432 MHz, and 1296 MHz for non-EME. He received the Fred Fish Memorial Award #3 for having worked all grid squares in the United States on 6 meters.

Rick graduated from the University of Arkansas with a B.S. degree in Mathematics, an M.S. degree in Operations

In 2009, Nodir received the YASME Excellence Award. He has participated in DXpeditions including YA5MM (1992), D44TT (2002-03), AP2ARS (2010), VP8ORK (2011), FT5ZM (2014), VP6R (2019). He has also participated as a Referee or Judge at the WRTC in 2006, 2010, 2014, and 2018.

The October program was "Most Wanted DX Entities" presented by Bernie McClenny, W3UR. As the Editor and Publisher of The Daily DX and The Weekly DX, as well as the editor of QST's "How's DX" column, Bernie has unique insights into the activation of rare DXCC entities. He went through his list of the "Top 25" most wanted entities based primarily on ClubLog statistics. Bernie clued us in on when some of these entities may be activated in the future as well as when they had their last activations by individuals or DXpedition teams. Not surprisingly, North Korea and Bouvet are at the top of the list. 
