### Ham Radio as a Prophylactic

We will get back to that topic just a bit further down the log. As this Newsletter is being drafted, we seem to have an actual current news update! ASC has announced that they will be reopening, though on a limited basis. Open exhibits will be limited to those that do not draw large groups or that involves close personal contact.

Since one of the main activities at W7ASC is when visitors are invited to try Morse code under the close guidance of a CARL volunteer, this hardly fits within current guidelines. Our normal operations required that the Volunteer and the visitor sit face to face with less than six feet of distance between them. So, the Ham Shack is not one of the exhibits that will be active during these first early reopening days. Everyone who has experienced or observed that process will understand the reason for this determination. Let us hope that such a limitation will soon be unnecessary.

This is not a Medical Newsletter! But even in layperson's terms, a prophylactic is a medication or procedure intended to prevent disease. COVID-19 has caused a rise in mental illness. An increased number of people suffer from depression. The rate of suicides has risen. These reports are in the public domain. The cause is reported to be the isolation required by defense against the virus. "Stay at Home" orders with bars, restaurants, gyms and water parks closing, leave many people with little social contact. We are told that parties & social gatherings are dangerous. Movies are closed. For some people, this is intolerable. But Hams need not experience such isolation, even if they do not have direct physical face-to-face meetings.

Anyone who has been following this Newsletter should be aware of the C.A.R.L. Net held twice weekly on the 440.375 South Mountain repeater starting at 0900 Wednesdays and Saturdays. This net gives the W7ASC volunteers a sense of community that is no longer available at ASC. There are other nets in almost every location throughout the USA that will also serve a similar purpose. Hams need not feel isolated! Also a further curative, studies suggest that the regular use of Morse code might even delay the onset of dementia.

Thus, Ham radio meets the definition of prophylactic. We are not, however, suggesting that any Ham take the purchase of Ham gear as a medical deduction. Unless, of course, that Ham has a prescription for SDR (as an example) from an MD.

This is a good point at which to remind all readers that everyone has a recruiting responsibility. There is no secret group who does that. As time passes, ham radio volunteers of all types move along and must be replaced. Even Hams get older! They move away, become disabled, and even join the ranks of the SK. No matter the method of contact, when you are talking to other Hams, be aware that some are retired or have spare time.

Volunteering at the ASC, once W7ASC reopens, is really a fun experience. You are really doing others a favor by introducing them to our hobby. For details on how to sign up, put a prospect in touch with almost any volunteer. A great place to start is at W7ASC.org. If every volunteer recruited only one new volunteer per month, the station would never run out of volunteers.

Remind yourself that you might actually be improving the health of anyone who is being guided to become a licensed Ham radio operator. A true Good Deed on your part! Become an active Elmer and take credit for saving a life!!

Let us hope that this topic will no longer need to be addressed by the time that we draft the next W7ASC Newsletter.

It's been a very busy summer for those of us in the Arizona Red Cross Communications Club. The hoped-for monsoon season has not brought much in the way of rain to our area and wildfires continue to threaten some communities. Most recently, Red Cross disaster responders were offering shelter and support to families in Gila County. We have also deployed volunteers to assist in Texas and Louisiana due to Hurricane Laura. Over 90 volunteers from Arizona and New Mexico are working in one capacity or another. One of our amateur radio operators who was deployed to Louisiana even before Laura made landfall has since been redirected to Houston to help with recovery efforts there.

As this is written, there are 45 active Disaster Relief Operations nationwide. One of our hams is heading to Sacramento to assist with the Red Cross response to wildfires in Northern California as a communications supervisor. Another may be tapped to head to Oregon as nearly 500,000 of that state's residents are forced to evacuate ahead of raging fires.

We continue to engage locally and work with our members to ensure that they have the skills necessary to assist at home in Arizona. Several participate in regular testing using HF and digital modes to communicate around the state.

At our August online meeting, Steve Lewis, AB7PA introduced AREDN mesh networking and how it can be used in Emergency Communications. Several of our members expressed an interest in exploring AREDN more fully and possibly setting up a node at the Red Cross chapter in Phoenix.

We are happy to report that several current Red Cross volunteers and employees are enrolled in an online technician prep class being conducted by the Red Cross chapter in Los Angeles. There are students from Yuma, Tucson, and the Phoenix area enrolled and looking forward to earning their technician privileges.

Coincidentally, we now have a newly accredited team of Volunteer Examiners through the Laurel Amateur Radio Club (LARC) and will be able to offer free VE sessions to our Red Cross colleagues when they are ready to take the plunge.

We will have an opportunity to put those new hams to work as we gear up for another nationwide Winlink exercise



This will be the first year that the Amateur Radio Council of Arizona has sponsored the Arizona QSO Party. Bill Clark, K6WSC, is the QSO Party Chairman. A flyer included with this newsletter explaining the various entry categories and other details. There's also a website at azqsoparty.org with rules and even more details.

For those who do not have their Worked All States award yet, this is a great way to get one. Other states will be hunting for Arizona. You'll be able to work CW, Phone, or Digital in this contest. If you're not a contester, this is a great way to get your feet wet and try it out. It's a friendly competition with no pressure. You don't have to own a contest super-station to win one of several plaques either.

And, if you care to travel to one of our most sparsely populated counties, you can be sure of stacking up a pileup. Those would be Greenlee county with a population of just over 9,400 people and LaPaz County which has 22,000 people.

Saturday, October 10 is the big day, starting at 1500 UTC and running until 0500 on Sunday, October 11.

This has been a remarkably successful event for years now, and we hope with ARCA sponsorship, it will get even better.

Other DXpeditions include A61AJ, AH3D, OH0/W3UR, VU4AN, YU8/OH2R (Kosovo), 8P9UR, J77A and most recently V47UR. He has also been a guest op multiple times at 4U1UN.

When not writing or on DXpeditions, Bernie can often be found on the air chasing new ones in the DXCC Challenge, hunting IOTA, chasing grid squares on 6 meters and guest operating in contests next-door at W3LPL.

At the September meeting, Alan, K0AV, presented "The Joy of Being a Double-Multiplier: Operating the CQWW CW Contest from Ascension Island - ZD8." Alan told us about his incredible trip to Ascension Island in 2016 where he operated with W6NV in the CQWW CW Contest. Surf and Turf makes for some fine dining, the best kind, through the winter months. For the person whose welldeveloped palate likes the freshest fish catch available, isn't it just grand that you can be, and are, your own Fish Monger! Planning out where Repeaters are for Radio Contacts along the way, and you come upon the Navajo Mountain Repeater and test it out to see if you can hit it from where you are and maybe making a new friend or two on the Airwaves while you are there adds to the whole experience. The taste and fun of going on that fishing trip is remembered well, as you savor each bite of those steak-sized Striper fillets and recount the highlights of the trip!

The picturesque beauty of those canyon walls near Page, Az., move a person, to appreciate its beauty once more, (even though they have been fishing all day for three days straight), and remark to the person closest to them, in almost effortless thinking, "Aren't those rocks and formations pretty?" and then a long pause as their eyes take in an overview of it all, even though they have been looking at them the whole day through from dawn to dusk, and then they give a peaceful, thoughtful nod in agreement. We do enjoy the different rocks, caverns, upheavals, or tall canyon walls that our State has to offer and showcase. Might as well, there's plenty of them. We've all seen a nice rock on the ground at one time or another that catches our eye!

It's also wood cutting season up here, looking for something to keep the cabin warm this winter. It's another chance to get on the Radio to see if you still have reception up in the mountains where you are going for wood. It's a great time to check if your radio is working fine and your antenna is taking care of the task at hand for getting out and receiving. It's also when a young family loads up the whole outfit of little ones of all ages, packs food and water for lunch, and gloves and boots if you haven't outgrown them, and having the hopes that the saw and pickup will make it for another season of wood gathering. They work hard to get a load of wood on limited days off of work and school, not to mention soccer games or gymnastics schedules. The children learn the art of stacking well, working hard with the family and appreciate the food and water provided when it's lunch time. They've got something invested for this winter to benefit the whole family by doing their part for helping to keep the home hearth warm against the cold outside, for when they come in from the snowman and snow angels they just built, and pop some popcorn and warm, chocolatey cocoa with maybe a marshmallow or two.

Enjoying the fresh air, the songs of the birds, chattering of squirrels, and seeing the different wildflowers that are putting on a great show of themselves all dressed up in their best petals to present their finest selves to the deep, blue, majestic sky makes the children's eyes sparkle as they notice everything out there and take delight in being there in the fresh air and sunlight, going here and there while they await the time of getting to work. The brownish hues of the bark and the green of the pine needles on the trees you see as you look from the base of a large stature Ponderosa Pine and your eye follows it up to see it touch the white, drifting, puffball of a cloud in that big, blue sea of a sky. Appreciation for this world becomes apparent. Some parents are on the phone with their grown children, who live in a warmer part of the State, and the conversation will eventually roll around to asking, "When are you coming up so we can get some wood?", or hauling some for others who may need it but can't go and get it. It is a lot of hard work, but when you make it a family and friends outing, many chainsaws make quick work of heavy loads.

We sure get a lot of warmth out of that wood that gets hauled in early Autumn. How many ways are there to get the most warmth out of each log that is burned, you ask? Well let's take a look at the whole process. You get warm when you de-limb the main log, when it's cut into rounds from the main log, when you carry it to the pickup and load it and stack it into the pickup, when you unload it and stack it at home, when you bust up the rounds into smaller pieces, when you load it in the wheelbarrow, when you fill up the wood rack, when you cover the rack to keep it dry, when you get an armload to bring in the cabin, when you chop up or pick up kindling for starting the fire, and finally, you get warm from a blazing, crackling fire on a very, very cold and snowy, blustery day and then stock the wood stove for the night fire. It's then you can sit back in your easy chair and fire up the HF Rig and channel surf for some

good conversations across the Frequencies, hoping the antenna line doesn't snap off or become disconnected, and you have to bundle up to go outside and fix it. It sure does perk a person up and bring in some sunshine when you get to talk to others when the winter days seem just a bit too long, and daylight doesn't seem to linger as long as it did in the long days of summer.




