
It's true that you only get one chance to make a good first impression and that is a fleeting moment in the mind of a band of grade school kids seeking the best return for their time at ASC.

Members of the Motorola Amateur Radio Club W7MOT were kind enough to notify members of the Chandler Ham Radio Club N7CHN that they intended to conduct their ARRL 2022 Summer Field Day at Gentry Lookout near Forest Lakes. This sounded like a fine opportunity to get out of the heat of the Phoenix metropolitan area for a few days and take the XYL Suzi and the dogs for a little time in Nature while also doing something fun and educational, namely portable radio ops on HF.

Forest Lakes is situated about 7700 feet elevation in Rim Country between Payson and Heber. The Gentry Lookout tower was about 6-7 miles from where we opted to stay, and that tower was where W7MOT had decided to set up their operation. A good choice at 7724 feet to get a signal out, and a lovely view of the surrounding countryside. Lots of trees to string up an antenna, with associated shade to help keep cool from the powerful Arizona sun. Shade turned out not to be an issue on this excursion.

We arrived late Thursday afternoon in Forest Lakes, unloaded, and set off to grab something to eat. They had just opened the 260 Roadhouse, so we went there. Now the drive up had been pleasant all the way, but when we arrived at the restaurant, we proceeded to get drenched in a monsoon cloudburst. The area had been under Stage 2 fire restrictions, and the Apaches had increased their own restrictions to stage 3. This was the first of what transpired to be wave after wave, or band after band, of monsoon storms. During the course of that first evening, I counted at least two more storms, one in the early evening and another about midnight.

We woke up Friday morning to a pleasant morning. It would be a while before the bulk of hams would arrive, so I decided to set up my station. I operate an Icom 706MKiig using Bioenno LiFePo batteries at 12aH and 15 aH capacity to my sturdy Tonypole antenna produced by Tony K7AJF. Flipped the switch and the only thing I heard was thunder. Here came another storm rolling our way, so disconnected antenna and shut down and brought in most of the gear.

A little later we went for a walk in the forest, taking the dogs. About midafternoon, we went to the Gentry Lookout and observed member of W7MOT arriving and setting up. A few guys were working on what I can only describe as a modified fan dipole antenna they shot about 75 feet up in the pine trees. One member, Erik K7TV arrived with his family including

Shirley, Lin, Lily, Miranda, and Sophia. I also had the pleasure of meeting Paul KD7KDO, Clark KI7TU, Tony WB7PZH, Mark KC7MP, Norm AA7OO and his lovely wife, another Tony whose call sign I wrote down incorrectly, and TD aka "Touchdown," whom I also missed his call sign, and other nice folks.

I think I brought more rain, also. So we departed and called it a night.

Saturday we went to the Gentry Lookout. It had rained last night again and it was a damp and chilly day. It was determined that I would operate the GOTA station on 10 meters. Folks were kind enough to scrounge up a couple chairs, a table, a cover to protect the rig from rain, and Tony lent me his 10M antenna.

Now you must understand that 10 meters is why I got my General when solar activity was less conducive to HF propagation. Indices were SFI = 115, K = 3, A + 8 per DXHeat. In the span of around 2-3 hours, I had heard three stations on 10M and worked almost one. Everyone was in Zeroland: W0BU, K0ETR, and W0FX. I heard them, but they didn't hear me. More wind and rain made for calling it quits. Other folks were set up more sensibly than myself operating on other bands and modes, but propagation conditions also seemed to be favoring us about the same as the weather.

Sunday was still damp and chilly. This time I just headed to Gentry Lookout by myself, driving through another band of rain in the process. Folks were breaking camp. I had heard that another member of N7CHN had arrived, but I did not see anyone from the Chandler club myself.

I assisted in helping move some equipment and being a ground guide to help drivers negotiate large vehicles in small turning radii. Then we made like a caravan driving off.

Suzi and I still had some time to be up there while most everyone else went home, but Sunday still did not favor portable ops outdoors. We had more rain that evening. By Monday morning, things were still unfavorable, but I took a chance in the afternoon when the weather gave us a break. I set up Monday afternoon and finally worked some stations. Lots of POTA and SOTA action, which I enjoy. My best was working John LY5A in Lithuania. With that, I called the excursion a success, as we had to depart the next morning.

Thanks to the thoughtful invitation from W7MOT to N7CHN, at least a couple members were able to experience Field Day for the first time. It is not like the Be-HIP events that N7CHN and CARS (Chandler Amateur Radio Society) do, and there are lessons to be drawn. Number one is study and prepare for the weather. Each Applicant will need to bring a picture ID (some test sessions require two forms of identification). An FCC-issued FRN number is required. If you do not have an FCC-issued FRN number, visit <u>https://apps.fcc.gov/coresWeb/publicHome.do</u> to obtain one. If you are upgrading your class of license, be sure to bring the original (and a copy) of your license and/or Certificate of Successful Completion of Examination (C.S.C.E.). There may be an exam fee required.

PLEASE NOTE: Dates, times, locations, fees may change. Arrive promptly at time listed. Fees may vary and exact change or check is required at most sessions. Call test session contact to confirm information. Walk-ins are permitted unless otherwise specified.

IMPORTANT NOTICE: In light of the current situation with the COVID-19 virus, please call to verify whether test session will be held.





Contest Tip this month – Software. In N1MM, there is a function called Super Check Partial (SCP). This file is kept up to date by K3CT. It shows potential callsigns as you type a call in the entry window. If you are missing a letter, or two, sometimes this call check window will help you figure out who you are working. N1MM now has a built-in feature that allows you to send your log from a contest to SCP by using a couple of clicks. I encourage you to send your logs in as it will help you and everyone else.

Our members include elite contesters who have operated from many DXCC entities around the globe as well as beginners wanting to learn more and who may submit a score of only a few QSOs. We encourage all stations, big or small, to get on and participate in contests and make contacts. There are excellent resources among club members and on our club website for contesting help.

Here are a couple of AOCC accomplishments-

MARCA's big news, of course, was Field Day. Once again we went to the campground at Gentry Lookout Tower, which is east-south-east of Forest Lakes, AZ. At a bit over 7000 feet altitude, it's quite a bit cooler weather than in the Phoenix area. The campground is close to the Rodeo-Chedesky wildfire burn scar, which is showing some recovery after 20 years.

Most participants arrived Friday afternoon and started setting up. There were a few glitches. After checking one of the wire antennas with an analyzer, it was brought down, adjusted, then raised again. There were several makeshift items, but that's part of the spirit of Field Day – being ready to make do with what you've got!

There were several periods of rain. Although we had canopies for both of the HF stations, the other stations had to make do with tarps to cover the radios while it rained, and mostly the operators retreated to their "portable Faraday cages," otherwise known as "automobiles," or to one of the HF stations to wait out the rain. Fortunately, the rain was fairly gentle, and was slow enough for it to soak into the ground without making a muddy mess. Certainly the trees welcomed the rain, even if it wasn't so popular with some of the participants!

We operated class "2A." Our final score for Field Day was a total of 310 QSOs for 2326 points. The highlight of the event was when, literally in the last minute of the Field Day period, Tony KB7U managed to get a satellite QSO via the International Space Station.

Despite the weather could have been better, and some bad band conditions, we all had a good time. There were a total of 15 people, including members, guests, and kids, in the annual "participants" photo," though there were a few more who left early. We did include a small memorial for the four members who became Silent Keys in the past year.

Looking forward, MARCA is going to continue to have informal monthly meetings via Zoom for the rest of the summer. We may resume having "combined" in-person and Zoom meetings in September, and are hoping to be able to resume having VE testing before the meetings then.
