October Column

September's first AARC 2-meter net produced a surprise for all of us. Thanks to the Echolink system that is now working well for us, we had a check-in from BH4AGO, an amateur located in Shanghai. The Echolink setup has made it possible for John, K7JHK, to join us on the net from Casa Grande, and we have had several other stations join us from out of state; however, BH4AGO is the first international visitor we have had on the net.

At our September meeting Gary, K7GH, gave a presentation on message handling and operating during an emergency. Although some members may have had experience with message handling, we now have a more immediate need for proficiency in this skill. The American Red Cross, whose facility we have been using for meetings, VE testing, and Field Day, has requested our help in operating their radio facility for emergency communications when necessary. Many members have volunteered to be on call for this, and the presentation on message handling and review of the Red Cross radio station's equipment was very well received.

As I write this column, I am at Torrance, California, attending the Hamcon 2011 ARRL Southwest Division Amateur Radio Convention. If attendance at major conventions has not been a part of your amateur radio activities in recent times, you are missing a very important part of the hobby. 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September Column

Greeting:

There doesn't seem to be much to write about this month. The weather is as hot as it is every summer, but at least it seems to me it's raining more this year. It seems I haven't had to water the grass as much. There are no activities going on except the first Saturday breakfast and the regular third Thursday meeting. That makes it kind of hard to write this column so I was thinking – Like the general population, most of our club members came to Arizona from somewhere else. Have you ever wondered what summers were like here in Arizona before we had air conditioning? Well, let me take you back in time.

When they were younger, both my grandmothers would travel every summer taking their small children with them. My father's family would drive to San Diego. They stayed at the same resort every summer. My mother's family would travel to the mountains. They stayed with her parents and took the train to get there. Even in the 1800's, everyone who could went to California for as much of the summer as possible. Some had standing reservations at a hotel for a specific period of time every summer. Children quickly learned, the one person you never wanted to upset was the landlady. Your reservations for next year could be "accidentally" lost.

This was not an easy trip to make. Elaborate preparations started days in advance. Steamer trunks would have to be aired out and filled with bedding and towels. Laundry would have to be done on a wash board. If you were lucky, you may have had one of those new fangled machines, a wringer washer. The laundry had to be hung on the line to dry which took no time at all. Then you had to light the stove so you could heat up your iron. In those days respectable women ironed everything they washed including sheets, towels and underwear. Most households employed a maid or two because a wife and mother just couldn't do it all.

There were no paved roads. Even in my childhood I can remember seeing parts of an old plank road that ran through the sand dunes between Yuma and San Diego. If you met a car coming toward you, one of you would have to yield the right-of-way and back up to a turn out until the other car passed. Remember the canvas bags that hung on the front of the radiator? In the fifties remember that round fan that fit in the

window that blew hot air into the car?

It took twice as long to go somewhere. Of course, there were no freeways. To travel from Phoenix to San Diego you had to drive through towns like Tacna-by-the-Sea. There were signs all along the way. Long before you reached Tacca there were signs along the highway "Free Coffee" "Stop for a free cup of Joe" "Stop by our café for a steaming, hot cup of coffee." When you stopped all you wanted was a giant glass of water. "Oh," they would say, "That will be a dollar. The coffee's free, but the water costs a dollar." Gordon's Well just on the other side of the sand dunes did the same thing.

Who can forget Gila Bend? There was a service station there who advised everyone who stopped that their water pump was leaking, but they could change it for a nominal amount. They tried this on my grandmother once. She left the car with them while she went next door to have breakfast. They were supposed to fill it up, check the tires and water. When she came back, they told her they had changed the water pump. They "couldn't sleep nights if they hadn't and such a sweet, little, old lady like her was stranded in the desert."

Now if there was one person in this whole world who could take care of herself, it was my grandmother. She demanded that they put her water pump back on.

"I'm sorry, but it fell apart when we took it off."

"I didn't ask you to change it. There was nothing wrong with it. You're going to put a new water pump on now and I'm not going to pay for it or you'll see what a sweet little old lady can do."

They did and she didn't.

In the good old days traveling was more of an adventure but would you want to trade it for the comfort you enjoy now?
