SKYWARN Recognition Day Saturday, December 5

The 17th annual SKYWARN Recognition Day (<u>SRD</u>) on-theair event is set for Saturday, December 5, from 0000 UTC to 2400 UTC. Cosponsored by ARRL and the National Weather



Service, SKYWARN Recognition Day pays tribute to Amateur Radio operators for the vital public service they perform. Registration is now open for stations planning to

participate from a National Weather Service (NW) Forecast Office; a <u>list</u> of NWS participating offices is on the NWS SKYWARN Recognition Day web page. During the 24 hour event, Amateur Radio operators set up at NWS offices contact other hams across the country. This event is also aimed at strengthening the bond between Amateur Radio operators and local NWS offices.

SKYWARN Recognition Day is not a contest. During SKYWARN Recognition Day amateur stations exchange contact information with as many National Weather Service-based stations as possible on SSB, FM, CW, RTTY, and AM on 80, 40, 20, 15, 10, 6, and 2 meter bands plus 70 centimeters. Repeater contacts are permitted.

Stations exchange call signs, signal reports, location, and a one or two-word description of the weather (eg, sunny, partly cloudy, windy, rainy). <u>Procedures</u> are detailed on the NOAA SRD web page.

The volunteer SKYWARN program comprises nearly 290,000 trained severe weather spotters -- many of them radio amateurs -- who identify severe storms and provide NWS forecasters with reports of local weather conditions during severe weather events.

W7ASC - 2015 WHAT WAS ACCOMPLISHED?

As the C.A.R.L. Year number 20 draws to a close, it seems appropriate to look back over our collective shoulders in order to observe just what we left on the trail. Litter? Gold? Or perhaps some other evidence of that journey.

But first! A report of an EVENT at the station.

It was either a Friday or Saturday in October. A nice lady was seen entering the gallery, looking neither left nor right. She headed straight for the Harkins Ham shack, holding hands with a young boy.

Once she felt the RF field, she started to address the volunteers who were on duty. Her left arm was extended, exposing the inside of the lower portion. She wanted a volunteer to examine that arm! She explained that she was wearing a tattoo that had been given to her by her grandfather, a WW II veteran who worked during that war as an Army radio operator. A CW operator, no less. The gift tattoo was, on closer inspection, seen to be Morse code! The visiting lady expressed the view that she was confident in the CW skills of the Volunteers. She wanted to be assured that the tattoo message was not some unwanted secret message.

Good news! The code simply read family(FAMILY).

The W7ASC corps of volunteers performs another critical public service.

And now back to the retrospective:

C.A.R.L stands for "Center for Amateur Radio Learning." Who benefitted from the Learning? And what did they learn?

As a rough estimate, half of the cherubs in Arizona learned to send their name in Morse. They probably soon forgot the exact code, even though they carried it with them in the form of a Certificate. There is strong evidence that many cherubs remember the experience. A growing number of visitors want to do it again – as grownups! The volunteers hear stories of school field trips, or Scout troop activities. Some schools teach the code, but only on paper. It should be noted that the majority recall the Morse lesson. Fewer mention time spent on the air. Those return visits, the times when parents bring their children to the place where they, the parents, first heard about and tapped out Morse code – are very heart warming. If nothing else happened at W7ASC, it would be well worth the effort. But other things DO happen! Conversations about the early

telegraph, isolating the Pony Express. The importance of electric communications (Telegraph) in the conduct of the Civil War. President Lincoln's early recognition of that importance, and the construction of a building that was filled with telegraph terminals. So the volunteers talk about this with visitors, Arizona residents are uniformed about the heliograph until they stop to chat at the Shack.

When done well, these conversations open the door to an explanation of Amateur (Ham) radio and its role in Public Service. The fact that Hams are allowed to use the airwaves for fun in order to hone their operating skills. Always ready for Public Service.

So — who learned what at the Station? Visitors were introduced to an old, but important technology—Telegraph and Morse code. They also heard about a fascinating hobby, the original "social network." If they listened, they learned that Ham radio operates when all other modes have been destroyed or damaged. Those visitors learned that it is not difficult to obtain a license, and there are a number of methods available through which the questions can be practiced. There is, of course, even a class that is held periodically right there at the Arizona Science Center.

Volunteers learned that most of their neighbors know very little about Ham radio—and those that know a little usually have it wrong. Volunteers learned how to talk about Ham radio to non-Hams. Volunteers realized that a large part of the Volunteer role is to teach. And, by answering all of those questions, most volunteers learned some surprising things about this hobby that they all, initially, believed that they fully understood.

Yes, it was a learning year for everyone. On balance, the Volunteers probably came out ahead.



Ed is survived by his sister Lois Karsten-Liddy and her husband Tim Liddy and by his ex-wife Kathy Karsten. His ashes will be spread at his favorite lake next May, near his birthday.



ABOUT ED

The facts are simple; the man was not.

First, he is also survived by hundreds of friends. Ed wasn't an especially friendly person (he liked most golden retriever dogs better than most people!), but he served those around him the best he knew how, and that's pretty endearing.

He served as a 9-1-1 operator and dispatcher with the Phoenix Fire Department

for 30 years. Ed was the last of the Old Breed of alarm room dispatchers who still knew how to do the job manually, with maps and building drawings and punch cards and banks of flashing lights, without the high-tech computers. He answered

the phone on peoples' worst day of their lives and his voice dispatched countless fire trucks (he called them "BRTs" . . . big red trucks) and medical crews. That was back when actual people made the radio TS A MENTAL DISORDER calls on the dispatch channels, not



Samantha, the sterile, faintly androgynous voice you hear dispatching today. Ed served in a time when real men and women dispatched fire crews, and computers were R2-D2.

Whereas he looked forward to retiring, pancreatic cancer pushed him to retire early. But this isn't about his cancer. This is about Ed.

Ed also served for about 20 years with the Rescue a Golden



group (www.golden-retriever.org) that finds good homes for sweet, lovable golden retriever dogs that people have neglected, abused, or otherwise don't deserve. Ed served in several capacities, most recently as Director. He never cared for the titles, only that uncaring people had their goldens taken away, the dogs were treated and healed, and good, caring homes received them. Ed even owned two vehicles. One was always an

SUV large enough to hold a kennel for golden transports

around the state. That's the kind of commitment all the Rescue a Golden people have, and so did Ed. The problem was big and thorny; Ed dedicated himself to being part of the solution. No telling how many golden retrievers are living happy lives with families they love because of this noble group. All for the love of a golden.

But that wasn't the extent of Ed's service. He also put his amateur radio "ham" license (callsign K9EDK) and skills to

use as a volunteer, protecting the safety and well-being of athletic runners, bicycle riders, and walkathon walkers through what is called public service communications. Working with a group of other radio people, Ed made sure that the course was safe, that injuries were treated quickly, and the participants had plenty of refreshments to avoid becoming one with the desert. Twenty years



ago, when it became hard to get radio recruits to help, Ed was one of the three charter members of the Maricopa County Communications Group (MCECG, Emergency www.MCECG.org). In fact, MCECG was invented in Ed's living room one evening with Jim Pierce, N7QVW, and Ron Reynolds, N7WTF. With that invention, sniggling politics and other nonsense were completely stripped away from public service communication, making it much more attractive to volunteer hams. That group is active and healthy three generations of leaders later, largely due to the wisdom and foresight of the foundation that Ed, Jim, and Ron laid in that living room.

So, Ed showed love by serving . . . serving people in crisis through the 9-1-1 alarm room, serving golden retrievers and those who love them through Rescue a Golden, and serving athletes and people supporting charitable causes through MCECG.

But when Ed wanted to be a kid again, he looked for merrygo-rounds. Yep, carousels. Bobbing horses, carriages, stage



coaches, tinny music . . . the works. Ed had worked in a carnival as a young man, and became enamored with carousels. Throughout his life, Ed attended annual conventions around the country that toured and showcased carousels from different eras, from different countries, and with different themes. That man

couldn't get enough of the wooden horsies!

The facts of Ed Karsten's life and death are simple. The man himself was far from it.

He loved intensely, but in his own way. And those of us who received that love were drawn like iron filings to a magnet. If it's true what the apostle John wrote in First John 4:8, "God is love," then Ed showed the family traits of his Father.



The Arizona Amateur Radio Club has been spending some time this past month on the roof of the new American Red Cross Building at 4747 N. 22nd Street. 

Ham clubs exist for a variety of reasons. Some are largely social with the prime purpose of allowing hams to get together and meet face to face. Some are service groups concentrating on EMCOMM and community service activities. Another group that I have been a member of for some time, 4x4ham.com, combines the hobbies of ham radio and off-road adventure with a great group of members to have a fantastic time in the outdoors.

Our club in Maricopa promotes Elmer-ing and Volunteer Examiner (VE) testing. While all clubs encourage new hams to get licensed to some extent, we make a concerted effort to bring new hams into the hobby. A really high percentage of our members are volunteer examiners. This allows us to be really flexible on scheduling tests. It's not unusual for us to schedule a test for a single individual who wants to take their first exam or upgrade their ticket on the way home from work. After all, the VE program was designed to make testing more accessible, and I believe that this accessibility has been instrumental in the increased number of amateur radio licenses issued. Bob Howard, W8RH, is our MVETS coordinator and has done a great job of scheduling exams and recruiting members to become VEs.

Of course, before taking the test, you have to study. Our club

has twice provided a "Technician Boot Camp," which consists of a three-hour session plus an eight-hour session, and an additional hour for testing. Josh Babb, K6FZ is the instructor, and he put the course together using the Gordon West study material. We have had several of our members get their ticket from this class. There's nothing that says "Elmer" like selflessly giving up a weekend to help others come into the ham radio hobby.

Another way that we keep club members in touch and informed is through an online forum. You can find it at http://w6sdm.net/Forum/. The forum is open to everyone, but you do have to register in order to post. You will find copies of various presentations that members have done, DIY articles, discussions, and other ham-related information.

The general feeling within our club is that one of the best ways we can contribute to amateur

Growing up in the Midwest, I wouldn't blink at a passing tornado, but this was a first experience with moving earth. Ironically enough, the statewide emergency drill, HAMEX, had been planning for months to use an earthquake as their simulated disaster. It carried on as planned on November 4th.

The ARA repeater sites are installed with emergency communications being a priority. When the power grid and communications channels go down, the repeaters will stay online. As HAMEX began, AEN-MAR was activated on Metrolink, Rimlink was used to communicate to Prescott, Payson, and Flagstaff, and White Tanks was used to connect to Wickenburg. AEN-MAR followed up the HAMEX exercise with a great SitRep net on November 9th. The topic

Hanging Out on the HF Bands

This month's column will be about the recent ups and downs for the HF frequencies. We are still having our share of solar events which can play temporary havoc with our HF bands. But absent unusual solar activity (you can check it at www.spaceweather.com) the bands are actually pretty exciting. Case in point is the recent CQ WW SSB contest, the weekend of 24-25 October. The sun was behaving itself and this popular contest had 10, 15, 20 and the lower bands filled with stations. Except for 10 meters (where I ended up), it was ORM from one end to the other for 20 and 15 because of the hundreds of stations in the contest. Our own N9NA, John actually logged over 500 contacts in a 48 hour period (with time out for food and a little rest) during the contest. I managed to work two new countries during the contest and logged about 50 contacts myself. Not everyone likes contests but you can certainly set your own schedule and level of commitment and operate as much or as little as you like. Submission of logs is not mandatory unless you want to officially compete with your fellow hams.

The lesson to be learned is that, absent the sun misbehaving, the HF bands are still usually open during early morning, through the day and into the evening in this part of the year. If you tune around and don't find anyone on, try calling CQ for 10 minutes and see who shows up. You can also check a spotting web site like www.dxwatch.com to see who is being reported as being heard in the US. Be sure to construct a filter so that you are only getting spots (de) from US stations.

So get that antenna up and tuned and spend some time with your fellow hams on our HF frequencies.

You'll have fun.

And send in your HF adventures so we can consider them for publication.

Code Talker Presentation



Dr. Laura Tohe gave a praiseworthy presentation on the code talkers. Dr. Laura said in 1942, Philip Johnston was trying to come up with another code using Native American languages. He knew the perfect Native American language to utilize in a new, unbreakable code.

Johnston spent most of his childhood on a Navajo reservation where his

parents served there as missionaries. He grew up learning the Navajo language and customs. Johnston became so fluent in the Navajo language that at age 9, he was asked to serve as an interpreter for a Navajo delegation sent to Washington, D.C. to lobby for Indian rights.

In spite of concerns about the security of a code based on a Native American language, the U.S. Marine Corps decided to give Johnston's idea a try. They approved a pilot project with 30 Navajos enlisting and to participate in the program.

No message delivered in the Navajo language was ever deciphered. Navajo Code Talkers served in the successful battles of Guadalcanal, Tarawa, Saipan, Iwo Jima, and Okinawa. Thirteen gave their lives in places like New Britain, Bougainville, Guam, and Peleliu.

Dr. Laura grew up in an Indian boarding school. The Indians were chastised for speaking their native tongue. Indian Boarding Schools remained in operation in the United States as late as the 1990s. The number of Native American children in the boarding schools reached a peak in the 1970s, with an estimated enrollment of 60,000 in 1973. Investigations of the later twentieth century have revealed many documented cases of sexual, manual, physical and mental abuse occurring at such schools.

In 1924, the US Congress passed the Indian Citizenship act which declared all non-citizen Indians born in the US to be citizens. However, because voting was considered a state's right, the states of Arizona and New Mexico kept Indians disenfranchised until 1948.

Because the Navajo reservation is located in the Southwest, primarily within the states of Arizona and New Mexico, the Navajo Code Talkers did not even have the right to vote when they were serving this country.

After the war, the original Code Talkers quietly returned to the Navajo Reservation and never spoke of the mission they completed until the late 1960s.

Dr. Laura mentioned that the hard work of the Navajo code talkers was not recognized until after the declassification of the operation in 1968. President Ronald Reagan gave the Code Talkers a Certificate of Recognition and declared August 14 "Navajo Code Talkers Day" in 1982. In 2000, President Bill Clinton signed a law which awarded the Congressional Gold Medal to the original 29 Code Talkers. President George W. Bush presented the medals to the four surviving Code Talkers

at a ceremony held in the Capitol Rotunda in Washington in July 2001.
